SUBJECT: Warrant Register

BACKGROUND:

For each City Council meeting the Finance Department prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval. The Register includes all recommended payments for the City. Checks, other than handwritten checks, generally are not released until after the Council approves the Register. The exceptions are for early releases to avoid penalties and interest, excessive delays and in all other circumstances favorable to the City to do so. Handwritten checks are those payments required to be issued between Council meetings such as insurance premiums and tax deposits. Staff reviews requests for expenditures for budgetary approval and then prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval and or ratification. Items such as payroll withholding tax deposits do not require budget approval.

The Deputy Finance Director hereby certifies that all requests for expenditures have been signed by the department head, or designee, receiving the merchandise or services thereby stating that the items or services have been received and that the resulting expenditure is appropriate. 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ORDINANCE NO. 1633

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING DIVISION 3 (INDUSTRIAL FEES) OF ARTICLE II (SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL) OF CHAPTER 94 (UTILITIES) OF THE SAN FERNANDO CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL WASTE FEES

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on June 21, 1993, the City of San Fernando ("City") adopted Division 2 ("Sanitary Sewers and Industrial Waste Division") of Title 20 of the Los Angeles County Code as the sanitary sewers and industrial waste regulations for the City, currently codified in the City's Code of Ordinances ("City Code") under Division 3 of Article II of Chapter 94 ("Industrial Fees Regulations"); and

WHEREAS, when adopting the Sanitary Sewers and Industrial Waste Division as its sanitary sewers and industrial waste regulations, the City chose to amend certain provisions to give the City flexibility in setting and adjusting Industrial Fee rates for various industrial waste compliance related activities; and

WHEREAS, the City is a member of the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County ("Sanitation Districts"), a public agency created under State law to manage wastewater and solid waste on a regional scale. This agency established an industrial source control program with the following objectives: (1) to enhance the Sanitation Districts treatment plants' ability to comply with effluent discharge requirements; (2) to protect the public, the environment, Sanitation Districts' personnel, and Sanitation Districts' facilities from potentially harmful industrial wastes; and (3) to ensure that industrial users pay their fair share of treatment operations and maintenance costs; and

WHEREAS, the City does not have the staff resources to ensure compliance with the Sanitation Districts' industrial source control program. As such the City has used the County of Los Angeles ("County") services since 1985 to provide the oversight and review on behalf of the City. The County issues industrial waste permits, conducts plan reviews, and inspection activities for the City, and charges individual contractors and businesses for the services based on the City's Industrial Fees Regulations for such services provided; and

WHEREAS, the County charges the City for any difference between the City's Industrial Fees (which it collects from individuals and businesses provided services) and the County's current fees for services under the Sanitary Sewers and Industrial Waste Division; and

WHEREAS, the City has not annually reviewed the City's Industrial Fees (which were set in 1989 based upon the County fees in 1989) nor has the City reviewed any increases in County fees under the Sanitary Sewers and Industrial Waste Division since 1989, and, as a result,

there is now a significant difference between the City's Industrial Fees and the County fees under the Sanitary Sewers and Industrial Waste Division; and

WHEREAS, due to these circumstances, the City is currently subsidizing approximately twenty percent (20%) of the County charges from the Sewer Enterprise Fund (which for FY 2013-2014 was approximately \$80,000). The discrepancy between the two fees range from 42% for specialty inspections/reviews to 20% for plan reviews; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to amend the City Code to allow Industrial Fees to be set by resolution of the City Council, whereby fees are set based upon the County fees plus the costs to the City in related staff services and thereby allowing the City to recover the full costs to the City of using County services to ensure compliance with the Sanitation Districts' industrial source control program.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and incorporated into this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. Amendment of Code. The City Council hereby amends Section 94-103 (Amendments) of Division 3 (Industrial Waste) of Article II (Sewers and Sewage Disposal) of Chapter 94 (Utilities) of the San Fernando Municipal Code to read:

"Sec. 94-103. Amendments.

The sections of the code adopted by section 94-101 are amended, as designated, to read as follows:

Section 20.20.361 is deleted.

Section 20.24.080 Damages caused by prohibited wastewater discharge is amended to read as follows:

Any industrial wastewater discharger who discharges or causes the discharge of prohibited wastewaters which cause damage to city facilities, detrimental effects on treatment processes or any other damages to the city shall be liable to the city for all damages occasioned thereby, including any penalty assessed against the city pursuant to federal law and as a result of such prohibited discharge.

Section 20.24.100 Administration is amended to read as follows:

Except as otherwise provided herein, the city engineer shall administer, implement, and enforce the provisions of these regulations. Any powers granted or duties imposed upon the city engineer may be delegated by the city engineer to persons acting in the beneficial interest of or in the employment of the city.

Section 20.24.190 Availability of city facilities is amended to read as follows:

If sewerage capacity is not available, the city may require the industrial wastewater discharger to restrict discharge until sufficient capacity can be made available. When requested, the city will advise persons desiring to locate new facilities as to the areas where industrial wastewater of their proposed quantity and quality can be received by available sewerage facilities. The city may refuse service to persons locating facilities in areas where their proposed quantity or quality of industrial wastewater is unacceptable in the available sewerage facility.

Section 20.24.220 Industrial wastewater user charges is added to read as follows:

A system of user charges shall be established by the city council to reflect fair and equitable charges for actual usage of sewer facilities. Such charges shall be based upon yearly volume, chemical oxygen demand (COD), suspended solids, and such other parameters or constituents that may be determined by the city engineer to create a burden upon the sewer system.

Section 20.24.230 Industry classifications is added to read as follows:

The city engineer may classify discharges by industrial categories and establish average industrial wastewater flow quantity and quality for each industrial category.

Section 20.24.240 Discrepancies between actual and reported effluent quantities is added to read as follows:

Should measurements of other investigations indicate that the industrial wastewater discharger has discharged industrial wastewater, chemical oxygen demand, suspended solids or other wastewater constituents at rates or in quantities in excess of those stated by the discharger on any report establishing the basis for industrial wastewater treatment and disposal charges, the city engineer shall notify the discharger and require that the discharger furnish all information in his possession relevant to the apparent discrepancy.

If, after making proper allowance for relevant factors, the city engineer is unable to resolve the discrepancy, he shall make a determination of the amount of any supplemental charges due to the city together with interest and penalty charges due thereon and shall notify the discharger of this supplemental charge. All costs of additional flow metering, sampling, and analyses performed by city shall be paid for by the discharger.

Section 20.28.020 Fees, records and charges is amended to read as follows:

The city clerk shall keep a permanent and accurate account of all fees and charges received under these regulations, containing the names and addresses of the persons on whose accounts the fees and charges were paid, the date and amount thereof, and the purpose for which charges were paid.

Section 20.28.040 is deleted.

Section 20.28.050 is deleted.

Section 20.28.060 is deleted.

Section 20.28.070 is deleted and Section 20.28.070 Refund procedures is added to read as follows:

A. In the event that any person shall have paid a fee as required under the sections set forth below and no work or processing has been done on these functions by the county engineer and the project has been formally abandoned or canceled, such person, upon presentation to the county engineer of a request in writing, on special provided forms, shall be entitled to a refund in an amount equal to 80 percent of the fee actually paid:

Section 20.36.031 Manholes, opening or entering prohibited is amended to read as follows:

An unauthorized person shall not open or enter, or cause to be opened or entered, for any purpose whatsoever, any manhole in any public sewer without a permit from the city engineer.

Section 20.36.136 Self-monitoring; effluent violation is amended to read as follows:

If sampling performed by any permittee indicates a violation, the permittee shall notify the city engineer within 24 hours of becoming aware or should have

become aware of the violation. The permittee shall also repeat the sampling and analysis and submit the results of the repeat analysis to the director within 30 days after becoming aware of the violation.

Section 20.36.137 Analytical requirements is amended to read as follows:

All pollutant analyses, including sampling techniques, to be submitted as required by the city engineer, by permit or otherwise shall be performed in accordance with the techniques prescribed in 40 CFR 136 or, if 40 CFR 136 does not contain sampling or analytical techniques for the pollutant in question, in accordance with procedures approved by the EPA and the director.

Section 20.36.185 Failure to comply, is added to read as follows:

In the event of a failure of the discharger to comply voluntarily with the suspension order, the city engineer may take such steps as are reasonably necessary to ensure compliance. These include, but are not limited to, immediate blockage or disconnection of the discharger's connection to the POTW.

Section 20.36.195 Request for hearing is added to read as follows:

Filing of such a request shall not stay a suspension. In the event of hearing requests, the city council shall hold a hearing on the suspension within 14 days of receipt of the request. At the close of the hearing the city council shall make its determination whether to terminate or conditionally terminate the suspension imposed by the city engineer, or the city council may cause the permit to be revoked. Reasonable notice of the hearing shall be given to the suspended discharger. At this hearing the suspended discharger may appear personally or through counsel, cross examine witnesses, and present evidence in his own behalf. In the event that the city council fails to meet within the time set forth above or fails to make a determination within 72 hours after the close of the hearing, the order of suspension shall be stayed until a city council determination is made with respect to the action of the city engineer.

Section 20.36.210 Revocation of permit is amended to read as follows:

The city may revoke an industrial wastewater permit upon a finding that the discharger has violated any provision of this section or the city's rules and regulations. No revocation shall be ordered until a notice and hearing on the questions has been held by the city council. At this hearing, the discharger may appear personally or through counsel, cross examine witnesses, and present evidence in his own behalf. Notice of the hearing shall be given to the discharger at least 15 days prior to the date of hearing.

Any discharger whose industrial wastewater permit has been revoked shall immediately cease and desist all discharge of any industrial waste covered by the permit. The city engineer may disconnect or permanently block the discharger's connection, if such action is necessary, to ensure compliance with the order of revocation.

After revocation of a discharger's industrial waste permit, there shall be no further discharge of industrial wastewater by that discharger into the POTW, the storm drain system, or the waters of the state unless there has been a new application filed, all fees and charges that would be required upon an initial application and all delinquent fees, charges, penalties and other sums owed by the discharger and/or the applicant to the city have been paid to the city, and a new industrial wastewater permit has been issued. Any costs incurred by the city, including administrative costs and investigative fees, in revoking the permit and disconnecting the connection if necessary, shall also be paid for by the discharger before issuance of a new industrial wastewater permit.

Section 20.36.225 Additional emergency remedial measures is added to read as follows:

The city engineer shall have full power and authority to take any necessary precautions, including but not limited to decontamination, sewer closure, packaging, diking, and transportation of materials, in order to protect life, protect property, or prevent further damage resulting from a condition that is likely to result in a discharge which presents an imminent hazard to the public health, safety or welfare; or which either singly or by interaction with other discharges, is an imminent hazard to the POTW; or which places the city in violation of its NPDES permit. In the pursuit of such an operation, city personnel, any party contracting with the city, or duly authorized representative of another government agency shall have immediate access to the premises. The city engineer may prohibit approach to the scene of such emergency by any person, vehicle, vessel or thing, and all persons not actually employed in the extinguishment of the condition or the preservation of lives and property in the vicinity thereof.

Section 20.36.230 Industrial waste disposal permit, application fee schedule is amended to read as follows:

The director shall collect a permit application fee for each application received. Such fee shall be separate and apart from any fee or deposit collected for industrial waste plan review or imposed under provisions of the plumbing code, or other city ordinance or regulations, or by reason of any license, agreement or contract between the applicant and other public agency. Such application fee shall

not be refundable even though the application be denied except as provided in section 20.28.070.

The city council, by resolution, shall establish, and may from time to time adjust or otherwise amend, a schedule of fees imposed pursuant to this section. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no fee set forth in the adopted fee schedule shall exceed the reasonable estimated cost of providing the services for which the fee is imposed.

Section 20.36.245 Industrial waste plan review, fee schedule is amended to read as follows:

A. The director shall collect a plan review fee for each set of plans received for any single site or location. Such fee shall be separate and apart from any fee or deposit collected for any permit or inspection or imposed by any other county ordinance or regulation. Such plan review fee shall be applied to any submittal required by the director pursuant to this division 2 and shall not be refundable even though the submittal be rejected or the project terminated except as provided in section 20.28.070.

The city council, by resolution, shall establish, and may from time to time adjust or otherwise amend, a schedule of fees imposed pursuant to this section. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no fee set forth in the adopted fee schedule shall exceed the reasonable estimated cost of providing the services for which the fee is imposed.

B. The director may impose a reinstatement fee of one-half of the plan review fee if the applicant fails to correct any plans or submittal upon written notice of correction or request for additional information by the director after three attempts have been made to gain such correction.

Section 20.36.250 Annual inspection fee; scheduling and billing is amended to read as follows:

A. For each industrial waste disposal permit issued by the director, an annual inspection fee shall be due and payable to the City annually, in advance, on a billing date to be determined by the director.

The city council, by resolution, shall establish, and may from time to time adjust or otherwise amend, a schedule of fees imposed pursuant to this section. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no fee set forth in the adopted fee

schedule shall exceed the reasonable estimated cost of providing the services for which the fee is imposed.

B. Immediately upon issuance of a new permit, the permittee shall be billed a percentage of the inspection fee, determined by the days remaining in the billing period, as scheduled below:

1—60	0
61—120	25
121—210	50
211—300	75
301—365	100

C. The annual inspection fee shall be increased by an amount to be determined by resolution of the city council for each approved rainwater diversion system.

Section 20.36.265 Wastewater sampling and analysis fee is amended to read as follows:

The director may charge the discharger a fee, to be determined by resolution of the city council, for each analysis performed by or on behalf of the director on wastewater samples taken from the discharger.

Section 20.36.270 Miscellaneous services fees is amended to read as follows:

The following services shall have fees which shall be paid before a review is made, approval is granted, inspection is made, operation is allowed or remedial action is implemented:

D. Table II - Services

Inspection of pretreatment facility pursuant to section 20.36.220

Review of site remedial investigation and cleanup plan to correct unauthorized release of industrial waste, initial deposit

Additional site remedial investigation and cleanup plan review and approval, per hour

Inspections outside of normal business hours, per hour

Inspections for which no fee is specifically indicated

Additional plan review or revisions of previously approved plans, per hour

Collection of wastewater samples

The city council, by resolution, shall establish, and may from time to time adjust or otherwise amend, a schedule of fees imposed pursuant to this section. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no fee set forth in the adopted fee schedule shall exceed the reasonable estimated cost of providing the services for which the fee is imposed.

Section 20.36.295 Annual review of fees is amended to read as follows:

The amount of fees in this chapter may be adjusted from time to time on an asneeded basis by resolution of the city council. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no such adjustment shall decrease any fee, and further, no fee shall exceed the reasonable estimated cost of providing the services for which the fee is collected.

Section 20.36.405 Discharge prohibitions is added to read as follows:

A. Except as expressly allowed in an industrial waste discharge permit, no person shall discharge, permit the discharge, cause the discharge or contribute to the discharge of the following to the POTW, the storm drain systems or waters of the state:

- (1) Gasoline, mercury, total identifiable chlorinated hydrocarbons, kerosene, naphtha, benzene, xylene, ethers, alcohols, ketones, aldehydes, peroxides, chlorates, perchlorates, bromates, carbides, hydrides, solvents, pesticides, or jet fuel.
- (2) Any liquids, solids or gasses which by reason of their nature or quantity are, or may be, sufficient, either alone or by interaction with other substances, to cause fire or explosion or be injurious in any other way to the municipal wastewater system. Included in this prohibition are wastestreams with a closed cup flashpoint of less than 140 degrees Fahrenheit (60 degrees Celsius). At no time shall two successive readings on an explosion hazard meter at the point of discharge into the system or at any point in the system be more than five percent nor any single reading over ten percent of the lower explosive limit (LEL) of the meter.
- (3) Any waste containing toxic or poisonous solids, liquids or gasses in such quantities that, alone or in combination with other waste substances, may create a hazard for humans, animals or the local environment; interfere detrimentally with wastewater treatment processes; cause a public nuisance; or cause any hazardous condition to occur in the sewer system.
- (4) Any waste having a pH less than 5.5 or more than 11.0, or having any corrosive or detrimental characteristic that may cause injury to wastewater treatment or maintenance personnel or may cause damage to structures equipment or other physical facilities of the sewer system.
- (5) Any solids or viscous substances of such size or in such quantity that they may cause obstruction to flow in the POTW resulting in interference or be detrimental to proper wastewater treatment plant operations. These objectionable substances include, but are not limited to, asphalt, dead animals, ashes, sand, mud, straw, industrial process shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, whole blood, paunch manure, bones, hair and fleshings, entrails, paper dishes, paper cups, milk containers, or other similar paper products, either whole or ground.
- (6) Stormwater, surface water, groundwater, artesian well water, roof runoff, subsurface drainage, swimming pool drainage, condensate,

- deionized water, cooling water and unpolluted industrial wastewater, unless specifically authorized by the city engineer.
- (7) Any water added for the purpose of diluting wastes which would otherwise exceed applicable maximum concentration limitations.
- (8) Any excessive amounts of petroleum or mineral based cutting oils, commonly called soluble oil, and which form persistent water emulsions.
- (9) Any dispersed biodegradable oils, fats and greases, such as lard, tallow or vegetable oil in excessive concentrations that would tend to cause adverse effects on the sewer system.
- (10) Any waste with an excessively high concentration of cyanide.
- (11) Any unreasonably large amounts of undissolved or dissolved solids.
- (12) Any wastes containing dissolved sulfides above a concentration of 0.1 milligram/liter.
- (13) Any pollutants which result in the presence of toxic gases, vapors or fumes within the system in a quantity that may cause worker health and safety problems.
- (14) Any wastes requiring an excessive quantity of chlorine or other chemical compound used for disinfection purposes.
- (15) Any excessive amounts of chlorinated hydrocarbon or organic phosphorous type compounds.
- (16) Any excessive amounts of deionized water, steam condensate or distilled water.
- (17) Any waste containing substances that may precipitate, solidify or become viscous at temperatures between 50 degrees Fahrenheit and 100 degrees Fahrenheit.
- (18) Any wastewater which imparts color which cannot be removed by the treatment process, such as, but not limited to, dye wastes and vegetable tanning solutions, which consequently imparts color to

- the treatment plants effluent thereby violating the city's NPDES permits.
- (19) Any garbage or waste that is not ground sufficiently to pass through a three-eighths-inch screen.
- (20) Any wastes containing excessive quantities of iron, boron, chromium, phenols, plastic, resins, copper, nickel, zinc, silver, lead, mercury, cadmium, selenium, arsenic or any other objectionable materials toxic to humans, animals, the local environment or to biological or other wastewater treatment processes.
- (21) Any blow-down or bleed water from cooling towers or other evaporative coolers exceeding one-third of the makeup water.
- (22) Any single pass cooling water.
- (23) Any wastewater containing any radioactive wastes or isotopes except as specifically approved by the city engineer in compliance with applicable state or federal regulations.
- (24) Recognizable portions of the human or animal anatomy.
- (25) Any wastes containing detergents, surface active agents, or other substances which may cause excessive foaming in the municipal wastewater system.
- (26) Any sludges, screenings, or other residues from the pretreatment of industrial wastes.
- (27) Any medical wastes, except as specifically authorized by the city engineer in a wastewater permit.
- (28) Any material containing ammonia, ammonia salts, or other chelating agents which will produce metallic complexes that interfere with the municipal wastewater system.
- (29) Any material identified as hazardous waste according to 40 CFR 261 except as may be specifically authorized by the city engineer.

- (30) Any pollutant, including oxygen demanding pollutants (BOD, etc.) released in a discharge at a flow rate and/or pollutant concentration which will cause or contribute to interference with the POTW.
- (31) Heat in amounts which will inhibit biological activity in the POTW resulting in interference, but in no case effluent exceeding a temperature of 140 degrees Fahrenheit or which exceed 104 degrees Fahrenheit at the point of entry into the POTW treatment plant.
- (32) Petroleum, nonbiodegradable cutting oil, or products of mineral oil origin in amounts that will cause interference or pass through.
- (33) Pollutants which result in the presence of toxic gasses, vapors, or fumes within the POTW in a quantity that may cause acute worker health and safety problems.
- (34) Any trucked or hauled pollutants, except at discharge points designated by the city engineer.
- (35) Floatable material which is readily removable.
- (36) Any substance which may cause the treatment plan effluent or any other residues, sludges, or scums to be unsuitable for reclamation and reuse or to interfere with the reclamation process. In no case shall a substance discharged to the system cause the city to be in noncompliance with sludge use or disposal regulations or permits issued under section 405 of the act; the Solid Waste Disposal Act, the Clean Air Act, the Toxic Substance Control Act, or other state requirements applicable to the sludge use and disposal practices being used by the city.
- (37) Any wastewater containing pollutants in sufficient quantity (flow or concentration), either singly or by interaction with other pollutants, to pass through or interfere with the municipal wastewater system, any wastewater treatment or sludge process, or constitute a hazard to humans, animals, plant or fish life or to exceed any limitation set forth to this section.
- B. Wastes prohibited by this section shall not be processed or stored in such a manner that these wastes could be discharged to the municipal wastewater

system. All floor drains located in process or materials storage areas must discharge to the industrial user's pretreatment facility before connecting with the system.

- C. The city may, from time to time, establish or revise by resolution, quantitative limitations with respect to the wastes referred to in this section. Such limitations shall be designed to bring the city into compliance with applicable state and federal requirements.
- D. Hospital wastes. Hospitals, clinics, offices of medical doctors, and convalescent homes:
 - (1) May discharge, through a city-approved grinder installation with inlet size and design features suitable for its intended use and so constructed that all particles pass through a maximum three-eighths-inch opening, wastes of the following categories:
 - a. Wet organic kitchen wastes from food preparation and disposal but excluding all paper and plastic items.
 - b. Disposable hypodermic needles, syringes and associated articles following their use.
 - c. Infectious wastes, defined as:
 - i. Laboratory and surgical operating room wastes except as excluded in subsection (2)(b) below.
 - ii. Wastes from outpatient areas and emergency rooms similar to those included in subsection (i) above.
 - iii. Equipment, instruments, utensils, and other materials of a disposable nature that may harbor or transmit pathogenic organisms and that are used in the rooms of patients having a suspected or diagnosed communicable disease which by the nature of the disease is required to be isolated by public health agencies.
 - (2) Shall not discharge to the sewer by any means:

- a. Solid wastes generated in the rooms of patients who are isolated because of a suspected or diagnosed communicable disease.
- b. Recognizable portions of the human anatomy.
- c. Wastes excluded by other provisions of these regulations except as specifically permitted in subsection (1) above.
- d. All solid wastes not included in subsection (1) above.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the authority of the health officer of Los Angeles County to define wastes as being infectious and, with the concurrence of the city engineer, to require that they be discharged to the sewer.

Section 20.36.406 Specific pollutant limitations is added to read as follows:

The following pollutant limits are established to protect against pass through and interference. No person shall discharge wastewater containing in excess of the following instantaneous maximum allowable discharge limits:

Arsenic	3.0 mg/l
Cadmium	15.0 mg/l
Chromium (total)	10.0 mg/l
Copper	15.0 mg/l
Cyanide (free)	2.0 mg/l
Cyanide (total)	10.0 mg/l
Lead	5.0 mg/l
Nickel	12.0 mg/l
рН	5.5—11.0 standards units

Silver	5.0 mg/l
Zinc	25.0 mg/l
Dissolved sulfides	0.1 mg/l
Dispensed oil and grease	600.0 mg/l
Floatable oil and grease	None visible
Temperature	140° F

All concentrations for metallic substances are for "total" metals. Compliance with all parameters may be determined from a single grab sample as well as composite sampling.

Section 20.36.407 City's right of revision is added to read as follows:

The city reserves the right to establish, by ordinance or in wastewater permits, more stringent limitations or requirements on discharges to the city's sanitary sewer system if deemed necessary to comply with the objective of this code. "

SECTION 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of the Ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. Effective Date. In accordance with Government Code section 36937, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from passage and adoption.

SECTION 5. Certification. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to certify to the passage of this Ordinance by the City Council and shall cause it to be published or posted as required by law.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the appointment of Captain John Ignatczyk as representative of the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) to the Disaster Council for a two-year term.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. The Disaster Council was established to develop and recommend for adoption by the City Council, emergency and mutual aid plans and agreements and such ordinances and resolutions as are necessary to implement such plans and agreements.
- 2. On June 18, 2012, Captain Christopher Cooper was appointed as representative for the LAFD to the Disaster Council for a two-year term.
- 3. On June 30, 2014, Captain John Ignatczyk contacted staff introducing himself as the new Disaster Preparedness Officer for LAFD (replacing Captain Christopher Cooper).

ANALYSIS:

Sec. 26-92. - Powers and duties; meetings.

It shall be the duty of the disaster council and it is empowered to develop and recommend for adoption by the city council emergency and mutual aid plans and agreements and such ordinances and resolutions as are necessary to implement such plans and agreements. The disaster council shall meet at least quarterly and upon call of the chairman or, in his absence from the

Disaster Council Appointment Page 2

city or inability to call such meeting, upon call of the vice-chairman. (Code 1957, § 7.4)

The Disaster Council has been especially active in the last few years in developing disaster preparedness and emergency plans. The Disaster Council has had good attendance by other agencies including Los Angeles Fire Department, American Red Cross, Providence Holy Cross Hospital, Los Angeles Unified School District, and Los Angeles Search and Rescue. The Disaster Council provides an opportunity to maintain relations with these important agencies and others serving the City of San Fernando. The Public Works Department and the Police Department work together to facilitate the meetings.

BUDGET IMPACT:

None.

CONCLUSION:

The appointments of Disaster Council members are important towards achieving a quorum to hold meetings.

Staff recommends the appointment of Captain John Ignatczyk as representative of the LAFD to the Disaster Council for a two-year term.

SUBJECT: Notice of Completion for San Fernando Regional Pool Facility Parking Lot

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Accept the improvements as constructed by E.C. Construction and consider the work complete;
- b. Authorize the issuance and filing of the "Notice of Completion" (Attachment "A") with the Los Angeles County Office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk; and
- c. Authorize the release of the 5% retention amount (\$12,019.36) after the 35-day lien period from the date the Notice of Completion is recorded.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On March 20, 2014, the City Clerk received and opened seven bids for construction of the San Fernando Regional Pool Facility Parking Lot Project. Staff analyzed all bids and determined the bid from E.C. Construction to be the lowest responsive bid.
- 2. On April 7, 2014, the City Council awarded a contract (Contract No. 1741) to E.C. Construction (Contractor) in the amount of \$236,058.42 and authorized the City Manager to approve change orders not to exceed 10% of contract amount.
- 3. On April 16, 2014, a Notice to Proceed was issued to the Contractor.
- 4. On June 30, 2014, work was completed by the Contractor.

ANALYSIS:

This project created 77 regular parking stalls, four American with Disabilities Act (ADA) parking stalls, planting of eight Chinese Pistache trees, construction of swales for storm water infiltration, and the installation of 11 new parking lot light fixtures.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The project was fully funded with Quimby Act Funds. The total construction cost was \$229,971.50 plus \$10,415.57 construction change orders for a total of \$240,387.07. This construction cost was under budget by \$19,277.19.

CONCLUSION:

The San Fernando Regional Pool Facility Parking Lot project is now complete. All work has been completed to staff satisfaction and is in conformance with the approved plans and specifications. Project acceptance and filing the Notice of Completion allows for the project to be closed out.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached letter (Attachment "A") opposing any proposed elevated or surface level rail line for the California High-Speed Rail Project through the City of San Fernando and direct staff to transmit said letter signed by all City Councilmembers to the California High Speed Rail Authority.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On May 14, 2014, the California High-Speed Rail Authority (CHSRA) staff conducted a community workshop at the San Fernando Regional Aquatic Facility to present the proposed design of the California High-Speed Rail Project's Palmdale to Los Angeles Project Section and solicit public input from attendees (see Attachment "B": CHSRA staff presentation). As part of the presentation, CHSRA staff noted the proposed regional and local projects necessary to implement the high-speed rail plan including double tracking, grade separations, sound walls, etc. that would be needed to implement the project. In addition, CHSRA staff noted that the proposed rail line project from Palmdale to Los Angeles would include elevated, surface and tunnel sections of rail line. Of particular interest to the City was the proposed 1.6 mile section of high-speed rail line section through the City that was proposed to be constructed at surface level creating potential significant adverse impacts to the City's historic downtown and civic center areas.
- 2. On June 16, 2014, the Councilmember Lopez made a presentation to the City Council about the CHSRA staff's presentation at the May 14, 2014 community workshop and the proposed High-Speed Rail Project's potential adverse impacts to the City. Subsequent to discussion, the City Council directed City staff to work with the North East Valley Transit Corridor Project/High-Speed Rail Project Ad Hoc Committee (comprised of Mayor Pro

Tem Gonzales and Councilmember Lopez) to prepare a response from the City to the CHSRA Board and staff) regarding the City's assessment of the proposed high-speed rail line design and alignment and its associated impact to the City of San Fernando. The intent of the response is to provide the CSHRA Board and staff with City feedback at this juncture as State Board and staff move forward with considering alternative high-speed rail line designs/alignments as part of the environmental assessment process that includes review of potential significant adverse impacts to the environment and the community pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA).

3. On July 9, 2014, the City Manager and the Community Development Director met with the Ad Hoc Committee and discussed possible project impacts and associated next steps for City Council consideration at their July 21, 2014 meeting. The attached letter opposing the elevated and surface level high-speed rail line design through the City is a result of the Ad Hoc Committee and City staff's efforts.

ANALYSIS:

The Ad Hoc Committee and City staff are recommending that the City Council approve and sign the attached opposition letter (Attachment "A") notifying the CHSRA Board and staff of the City's opposition to an elevated or surface high-speed rail line through the City. Approving the opposition letter and transmittal of the letter to the CHSRA Board and staff at this time is intended to facilitate the consideration of a tunnel alternative as part of the CEQA and NEPA process. Approval of an Environmental Impact Report (the CEQA document) and Environmental Impact Statement (the NEPA document) is needed before the CHSRA Board can approve the final design of the California High-Speed Rail Project's Palmdale to Los Angeles Project Section.

CONCLUSION:

City Council approval of the attached opposition letter (Attachment "A") will ensure that the City's position on the current design of the high-speed rail line through the City of San Fernando is on record with the CHSRA Board and staff as they move forward with the consideration of project design alternatives and the associated environmental assessment that must be completed before a final project design is approved by the CHSRA Board for the Palmdale to Los Angeles Project Section.

BUDGET IMPACT:

City Council approval and signing of the attached opposition letter to the CHSRA Board and staff will not have an impact on the City's General Fund Budget.

Honorable Chairperson Richard:

This letter is to inform you that the San Fernando City Council has voted to oppose any proposed elevated or surface level rail line for the High-Speed Rail Project through the City of San Fernando. This decision was based on the potential adverse significant impacts to the City of San Fernando's historic downtown and civic center areas and the overall quality of life of our community.

The San Fernando City Council has come to this determination after hosting two community meetings regarding the proposed High-Speed Rail Project through the Southern California Region, and more specifically, the proposed surface level path of the high-speed train through San Fernando. The most recent meeting was held on May 14, 2014. At that meeting and subsequent to said meeting, the San Fernando City Council has heard concerns from local citizens that there is strong opposition to the option presented by CHSRA representatives. The proposed surface level high-speed rail line will require amongst other things, grade separations, sound walls, and double tracking through its 1.6 mile portion that runs through the City of San Fernando. The proposed rail line alignment at surface and an elevated rail design would effectively split the community in half and obliterate the City's historic downtown area and civic center area that are located on both sides of the proposed pathway of the High-Speed Rail Project.

As you are aware, the California High-Speed Rail Project was overwhelmingly approved by California voters in order to provide the State with the 220 miles-per-hour, high-speed rail as an alternative mode of transportation to vehicular and air travel under the premise that the project would improve access to good-paying jobs, cut pollution from smog-filled roadways, and reduce time wasted sitting in traffic while providing an alternative to high fuel prices. To this end, the San Fernando City Council, through its Northeast San Fernando Valley Transit Corridor Project Ad Hoc Committee, has taken a collaborative approach with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Authority and the City of Los Angeles to develop tram, bus rapid transit, and light rail transit alternatives that will further expand public transportation opportunities to residents of the North East San Fernando Valley and the City of San Fernando, but doing so in a manner that seeks to mitigate impacts to local residents and business along the proposed transit route.

In a similar manner, the San Fernando City Council requests that the CHSRA consider a High-Speed Rail Project alternative that looks at installing the proposed high-speed rail lines in a tunnel similar to the rail line design being proposed near downtown Los Angeles and in the City of Santa Clarita. The San Fernando City Council, through its existing North East San Fernando Valley Transit Corridor Project Ad Hoc Committee, would be willing to have a continued discussion on a proposed tunnel design for the high-speed rail line through the City of San Fernando, including discussion about possible adaptive reuse/open space/greenway corridors alternatives that may be realized by installing the rail line underground. The San Fernando City Council supports the concept of a high-speed rail project to bring about greater mobility for all California residents and we would certainly like to continue to work with your agency through the process of open community dialogue to develop an appropriate high-speed rail alignment and design that mitigates the impacts to our community to the fullest extent possible before the CHSRA Board commits to one alignment/rail design.

However, at this time it is the San Fernando City Council's intent to inform the CHSRA Board and staff of its current opposition to the high-speed rail line being considered for construction as a surface or elevated rail line through the City of San Fernando. The San Fernando City Council feels that it should not be considered as a project alternative as part of the CEQA and NEPA review process due to its potential significant adverse impacts to the City of San Fernando's historic downtown and civic center areas and as a result to the potential adverse impact to the public health, safety, and general welfare of the City of San Fernando residents, business and property owners directly affected by the proposed High-Speed Rail Project.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached letter (Attachment "A") of support for San Fernando Community Health Center's New Access Point (NAP) proposal for Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) status under Section 330 of the Public Health Services Act and authorize the Mayor to execute said letter.

BACKGROUND:

San Fernando Community Hospital dba Mission Community Hospital (MCH) was a private non-profit safety net hospital that had been providing high-quality affordable healthcare to its surrounding communities in the San Fernando Valley for close to 90 years. In 2013, MCH was purchased by an investment company and switched from a non-profit to a for-profit status. As a continuation of the hospital's Community Benefits Program, the private investment company supported the construction of a new comprehensive primary care facility. This new primary care facility is now operated by the non-profit entity that formerly operated the hospital. The non-profit, San Fernando Community Hospital, now uses the dba San Fernando Community Health Center (SFCHC). Its articles of incorporation have been recently amended to note that the corporation's primary purpose is no longer the operation of a hospital but to provide outpatient primary health services in underserved areas for medically underserved populations as a community health center.

SFCHC is headquartered at 732 Mott Street, Suites 100-120 San Fernando, CA 91340 and operates a new state-of-the-art clinic comprising 17,115 square feet, which includes a newly expanded dental clinic with 10 operatories, a primary care clinic with 15 exam rooms and 2 behavioral health rooms, and the Community Diabetes Center, which houses the Diabetes Teaching Kitchen and Project ALTO-DTM. SFCHC became operational June 2013, offering medical, dental, behavioral health, and enabling services to uninsured and underserved individuals in the San Fernando Valley.

SFCHC's mission is to build upon its historical legacy of caring for the community by providing high-quality, state-of-the-art health care services, as well as prevention and education services, to the most vulnerable of the San Fernando Valley within a caring and compassionate environment. SFCHC currently operates a fixed-site comprehensive community health center serving California's 29th Congressional District. This service area has some of the poorest health indicators in Los Angeles (LA) County, yet still lacks the number of Section 330 grantees to meet the needs of this population. Indeed, over 150,000 low-income individuals within SFCHC's service area are not able to access healthcare services at local FQHCs and FQHC Look-Alikes (www.UDSmapper.org).

ANALYSIS:

SFCHC offers a wide range of medical, dental, behavioral, and enabling services to address the needs of its community. Patients are never turned away for their inability to pay. SFCHC is submitting its application for New Access Point (NAP) funding in order to continue its drive to provide high-quality, affordable, and accessible care to its patients and the many communities of the San Fernando Valley. SFCHC's target population is defined as those individuals in SFCHC's service area living at or below 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). SFCHC's proposed clinic model is delivered with an emphasis on compliance, governance, and quality improvement. SFCHC aims to provide 12,427 visits representing 4,432 patients in the first year of its project period.

CONCLUSION:

City Council approval of the attached letter of support for San Fernando Community Health Center's New Access Point (NAP) proposal for Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) status under Section 330 of Public Health Services Act will assist in ensuring that much needed health prevention and wellness services will continue to be provided to the San Fernando community.

SUBJECT: Consideration to Adopt a Resolution Finding the City to be in Conformance with

the Congestion Management Program (CMP) for Los Angeles County and

Approving the City's 2014 CMP Local Development Report

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Conduct a Public Hearing; and
- b. Pending public testimony, adopt Resolution No. 7632 (Attachment "A") certifying that the City is in conformance with the Congestion Management Program (CMP) for Los Angeles County, and approving the City's 2014 CMP Local Development Report (Attachment "B") for the reporting period from June 1, 2013 to May 31, 2014.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In June of 1990, the State legislature adopted legislation (Proposition 111) establishing the Congestion Management Program (CMP), a state mandated regional planning process intended to address regional congestion. The legislature determined that urban congestion was adversely impacting the economic vitality of the State of California and the quality of life in many regions and communities throughout the State. The 1992 CMP made the link between regional transportation, land use and air quality impacts attributed to local development.
- 2. On December 21, 1992, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1417 approving a Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Ordinance for the City of San Fernando, in conformance with the CMP for Los Angeles County. The TDM Ordinance provides for the inclusion of measures to reduce vehicle trips associated with new non-residential development. The objective of the ordinance is to have such new development include

building and site design features that support the use of alternative modes of transportation other than single-occupant (driver-only) car trips (e.g., bicycle parking, preferred parking for carpools and vanpools, direct building access from the street for pedestrians and transit patrons, and convenient transit waiting areas at or in close proximity to the proposed project sites). Also, it involves the implementation of specific building requirements that promote alternative modes of transportation and help alleviate congestion issues at the local and statewide level.

- 3. On November 1, 1993, the State legislature required that regional CMP's include a Land Use Analysis Program. This component of the CMP requires local jurisdictions to consider the impact of new developments on the regional transportation system as part of their decision-making process.
- 4. In 1994, the City of San Fernando like all other jurisdictions in Los Angeles County adopted resolutions providing for the annual tracking and reporting of all new development activity as required by the CMP Countywide Deficiency Plan. Annual recording periods are from June 1st through May 31st. New development recorded as part of the LDR include: new development activity, new development adjustments, and exempted development activity.
- 5. On July 22, 2004, the Board of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority, also known as "Metro", adopted the 2004 CMP for Los Angeles County. This regional CMP required each municipality within the County to conduct a noticed Public Hearing and adopt a Resolution annually (by September 1st) certifying that the municipality is adhering to the CMP implementation measures, and including a LDR. During this time period, the Metro Board also authorized the Short Range Transportation Plan that included a nexus study to evaluate the feasibility of implementing a congestion mitigation fee. The fee is intended to ensure new growth directly mitigates its traffic impacts on the regional transportation system by helping fund local transportation improvements. The fee study is still ongoing.
- 6. On October 28, 2010, the Metro Board adopted the 2010 CMP for Los Angeles County. The 2010 CMP summarizes the results of 18 years of CMP highway and transit monitoring and 15 years of monitoring local growth. CMP implementation guidelines for local jurisdictions are also contained in the 2010 CMP.
- 7. As in past years, a Public Hearing has been scheduled for the City Council to consider a Resolution certifying that the City is adhering to all applicable CMP implementation measures for the 2013-2014 reporting period. Staff has published a notice of such a Public Hearing by the City Council on July 11, 2014 in the *Los Angeles Daily News* newspaper.

ANALYSIS:

CMP Planning Process Significance. The CMP process was created to link local land use

decisions with their impacts on regional transportation and air quality, and to develop a partnership among transportation decision-makers in devising appropriate transportation solutions that include all modes of travel (2010 Congestion Management Program for Los Angeles County, Pg. 4). (Source: http://www.metro.net/projects/congestion_mgmt_pgm/.) The CMP requires local jurisdictions to consider the impact of new developments on the regional transportation system as part of their decision making process and report such impacts as part of the LDR submitted to Metro.

The City's reporting process is part of the CMP Land Use Analysis Program. The Program relies on the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process to ensure that a mechanism is in place whereby a local community can consider the regional impact of new development on the CMP system.

To comply with the CMP Land Use Analysis Program requirement, the City on March 1, 1993, amended its local procedures for implementing CEQA guidelines (Resolution No. 5364) and incorporated the Land Use Analysis required language to assess project impacts on the regional transportation system (Resolution No. 6235). It is important to note that "self-certification" of conformance with the regional CMP is important to the City in order to preserve the City's eligibility to receive State Gas Tax funds and other State and Federal funding for transportation improvements.

Self-Certification. In Los Angeles County, Metro is the regional agency designated by the State to adopt a CMP for this region, and to monitor and determine that local jurisdictions are in conformance with the countywide CMP. Municipalities are required to "self-certify" their conformance to local requirements of their regional CMP on an annual basis in order to continue receiving their portion of State Gas Tax money, and to preserve their eligibility for other State and Federal funding for transportation projects.

The proposed Resolution certifies that the City continues to carry out measures contained in the ordinance and resolutions adopted by the City Council in conformance with all the applicable requirements of the 2010 CMP for Los Angeles County. It also approves the City's 2014 LDR, which tracks the City's new development activity for the period from June 1, 2013 through May 31, 2014. The attached Resolution and 2014 LDR must be reviewed and approved by the City Council and submitted to the Metro by September 1, 2014.

Current year "Local Development Report". Metro is in the process of considering a new approach to the CMP's "Countywide Deficiency Plan" process. Prior to adoption of the CMP in 2004 and under the current 2010 CMP, the CMP's Countywide Deficiency Plan required a "Local Implementation Report" that specified CMP "credits" and "debits" for each jurisdiction. These numerical credits and debits were based on traffic congestion mitigating measures or capital improvements ("credits") and new development that could incrementally add to regional traffic congestion ("debits"), with each jurisdiction required to implement measures referred to as "transportation improvement strategies" to maintain a positive balance.

In August of 2003, in response to dissatisfaction with the Local Implementation Report process, Metro staff was directed by the Metro Board to prepare a nexus study to assess the feasibility of implementing a congestion mitigation fee program that would fund transportation improvements that mitigate deficiencies in the county's transportation system; and the requirement for local jurisdictions to prepare an annual Local Implementation Report was suspended for the meantime.

In September 2008, the Metro Board approved the Congestion Mitigation Fee Feasibility Study Report (Study Report) to consider the implementation of a Congestion Mitigation Fee. The Study Report established the guidelines for the proposed program and the framework for working with local jurisdictions to identify local transportation projects with regional benefits, estimating project costs, and confirm growth forecasts that could be used as a basis for establishing a nexus for the development of a fee program. Metro staff is currently working with sub-regional Councils of Governments (COGs), local jurisdictions, the private sector, the Congestion Mitigation Fee Policy Advisory Committee (PAC), and other stakeholders to solicit input on the merits and feasibility of a creating and implementing a Congestion Mitigation Fee program that would work in Los Angeles County.

On October 28, 2010, the Metro Board adopted the 2010 CMP for Los Angeles County. The 2010 CMP summarizes 18 years of highway and transit monitoring and 25 years of monitoring local growth.

Metro staff has previously notified the City that while work on the Congestion Mitigation Fee feasibility study continues, the CMP Countywide Deficiency Plan requirement for maintaining a positive credit balance will continue to be suspended. As a result, cities are not required nor requested to report their transportation improvement strategies for the 2014 cycle.

Between September of 2008 and December of 2012, Metro has released the following reports as part of the Congestion Mitigation Fee Study analyzing the feasibility of mitigation fee measures for all land uses in eight sub-regional jurisdictions: the CMP Congestion Mitigation Fee Feasibility Study Report; Congestion Mitigation Fee Nexus Analysis Methodology Report; Sub-regional Economic Analysis Reports; and, the Pilot Nexus Study Reports. As of the writing of this report, the Metro Board has not officially adopted the Congestion Mitigation Fee.

For the 2013-2014 reporting period, cities are still required to track and report new development activity that represents new net development after subtracting for building permit revocations or demolitions. Such new development generates "debits" under the transportation system impact monitoring component of the Countywide Deficiency Plan process. However, reporting of transportation improvements that were historically used to generate "credits" for the Countywide Deficiency Plan purposes are not required, and therefore cities are not currently required to maintain a positive credit balance as part of the "Transportation Mitigation and Improvement Reporting" process. During this time, no new credits will be earned by cities. Nonetheless, the City continues to maintain a positive credit balance.

After holding a noticed Public Hearing, cities must still adopt a Resolution self-certifying CMP conformance, and incorporating by reference the current reporting form known as the LDR. The LDR is based on the prior Local Implementation Report from reporting cycles prior to 2004, but it requires cities to report information only on new net development and excludes the calculation of Countywide Deficiency Plan debits or credits.

Local Development Report Results. Even though the City will not accrue new credits during the current reporting period, it is staff's assessment that development activity (i.e., new construction versus demolition) that took place from June 1, 2013 through May 31, 2014, clearly shows that the City continues to maintain a surplus of credits under the CMP. During the reporting period, six single-family residential units and eight duplex residential units were constructed totaling approximately 15,126 square feet of floor space, while a medical clinic facility totaling 9,993 square feet and an institutional (church assembly hall) facility totaling 8,263 were also issued building permits and initiated construction during this period. There were no units demolished during this reporting period. As noted in the LDR, during the reporting period 32 exempted low-income units were also issued building permits and construction work initiated. Staff has determined that any future traffic impacts associated with new development will be mitigated through the CEQA process, and through the continued implementation of the City's transportation demand management regulations.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the Resolution finding that the City is in conformance with the CMP for Los Angeles County, and approve the City's 2014 LDR for the reporting period from June 1, 2013 to May 31, 2014. This "self-certification" of conformance with the regional CMP will preserve the City's eligibility to receive State Gas Tax funds and other State and Federal funding for transportation improvements.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Adoption of this Resolution and the approval of the associated 2014 CMP LDR will have no impact on the City budget.

RESOLUTION NO. 7632

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, CALIFORNIA, FINDING THE CITY TO BE IN CONFORMANCE WITH THE CONGESTION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (CMP) AND ADOPTING THE CMP LOCAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT, IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65089

WHEREAS, CMP statute requires the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA"), acting as the Congestion Management Agency for Los Angeles County, to annually determine that the County and cities within the County are conforming to all CMP requirements; and

WHEREAS, LACMTA requires submittal of the CMP Local Development Report by September 1st of each year; and

WHEREAS, the San Fernando City Council held a noticed Public Hearing on July 21, 2014.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, FIND, DETERMINE, AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the City of San Fernando (the "City") has taken all of the following actions, and that the City is in conformance with all applicable requirements of the 2010 CMP adopted by the LACMTA Board on October 28, 2010.

The City has locally adopted and continues to implement a transportation demand management ordinance, consistent with the minimum requirements identified in the CMP Transportation Demand Management chapter.

The City has locally adopted and continues to implement a land use analysis program, consistent with the minimum requirements identified in the CMP Land Use Analysis Program chapter.

The City has adopted a Local Development Report, attached hereto and made a part hereof (Exhibit "1"), consistent with the requirements identified in the 2010 CMP. This report balances traffic congestion impacts due to growth within the City with transportation improvements, and demonstrates that the City is meeting its responsibilities under the Countywide Deficiency Plan consistent with the LACMTA Board adopted 2003 Short Range Transportation Plan.

SECTION 2. That the City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Resolution and shall forward a copy of this Resolution to the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

Exempted Development Definitions:

- 1. Low/Very Low Income Housing: As defined by the California Department of Housing and Community Development as follows:
 - Low-Income: equal to or less than 80% of the County median income, with adjustments for family size.
 - Very Low-Income: equal to or less than 50% of the County median income, with adjustments for family size.
- 2. High Density Residential Near Rail Stations: Development located within 1/4 mile of a fixed rail passenger station and that is equal to or greater than 120 percent of the maximum residential density allowed under the local general plan and zoning ordinance. A project providing a minimum of 75 dwelling units per acre is automatically considered high density.
- 3. Mixed Uses Near Rail Stations: Mixed-use development located within 1/4 mile of a fixed rail passenger station, if more than half of the land area, or floor area, of the mixed use development is used for high density residential housing.
- 4. Development Agreements: Projects that entered into a development agreement (as specified under Section 65864 of the California Government Code) with a local jurisdiction prior to July 10, 1989.
- 5. Reconstruction or replacement of any residential or non-residential structure which is damaged or destroyed, to the extent of > or = to 50% of its reasonable value, by fire, flood, earthquake or other similar calamity.
- 6. Any project of a federal, state or county agency that is exempt from local jurisdiction zoning regulations and where the local jurisdiction is precluded from exercising any approval/disapproval authority. These locally precluded projects do not have to be reported in the LDR.
