Mayor Sylvia Ballin called the meeting to order at 6:12 p.m.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

City Manager Saeki reported that the Closed Session Item A was postponed to an uncertain date.

Motion by Councilmember Lopez, seconded by Councilmember Avila, to approve the agenda as amended. By consensus, the motion carried.

PUBLIC STATEMENTS – WRITTEN/ORAL

Jaime Soto stated that Police Chief Parks assisted him with several neighborhood issues and he reported that he will be circulating a petition regarding people running stop signs and speeding.

John Blue said that he was assisting a woman that worked as a cleaning lady at Recreation Park, was unfairly treated, and was eventually fired by the janitorial service contractor.

(Female speaker – did not state name) said she used to work at Recreation Park and said she was fired from her job, felt it was unjust, and said she hopes to go back to work.

Robert Ortega believes that the skateboarders (or their parents) should get cited for skateboarding where they shouldn't be and for the graffiti they've done. He also talked about the JC Penney building and asked why would we allow the building to be destroyed?

Patty Lopez talked about agenda Item No. 3, everything is moving too fast, and said that we need to do our best to inform the community and share the project details with everyone.

Paul Luna said that Heritage Park is underutilized and asked if the City has prepared a disaster response plan (before we find ourselves in a situation similar to the 1971 earthquake).

Carolina Perez said that the apartments on Park Ave. have created congested parking, is concerned about the number of people will live at the new apartments, and said that residents were not made aware.

In response to a question earlier, City Manager Saeki reported that the City does have a Disaster Plan and, recently, the Disaster Council held an exercise with all City departments simulating a catastrophic event whereby the Emergency Operations Center was activated.

3) ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE NO. 1634 ADOPTING ZONE MAP AMENDMENT 2014-001, AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO TO REZONE PORTIONS OF 1140 AND 1148 SAN FERNANDO ROAD FROM THE TRUMAN/SAN FERNANDO DISTRICT AND MIXED-USE TRANSITION SUBDISTRICT OF THE SP-4 (CORRIDORS SPECIFIC PLAN) ZONE TO THE DOWNTOWN DISTRICT AND SAN FERNANDO MALL DISTRICT OF THE SP-4 (CORRIDORS SPECIFIC PLAN) ZONE

Mayor Ballin said she struggled that she was not able to attend the special meeting (it was a very important subject) but changing her plans would have personally cost her. She pointed out the short time frame given to Council to review and analyze the project. In fairness to the Council and community, she asked that staff provide more lead time when there are very important matters placed on the agenda. She also stated that she does not want San Fernando to become the low-income city in the Valley and believes that we need to become more strategic in how we move forward with additional low-income projects.

Staff replied to Mayor Ballin's concerns regarding the timing and accelerated schedule and reported that due to the notice of funding availability and tax credit financing, the time frame was short. Overall, the goal is to invigorate the Mall area.

Discussion ensued amongst Councilmembers and staff.

City Attorney Olivarez called for a brief recess.

Mayor Ballin thanked staff for responding to her questions and said that since she was not at the first hearing and, in fairness to the developer, residents, and Councilmembers, said she would abstain from voting on the item.

Brief discussion ensued amongst Councilmembers and Adriana Gomez, Aszkenazy Development, replied to questions.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Gonzales, seconded by Councilmember Avila, to introduce for first reading (in title only) and waive further reading of Ordinance No. 1634 to adopt by title only, "An Ordinance of the City of San Fernando Adopting Zone Map Amendment 2014-001, Amending the Zoning Map of the City of San Fernando to Rezone Portions of 1140 and 1148 San Fernando Road from the Truman/San Fernando District and Mixed Use Transition Sub-District of the SP-4 (Corridors Specific Plan) Zone to the Downtown District and San Fernando

Mall Sub-District of the SP-4 (Corridors Specific Plan) Zone". The motion carried with the following vote:

City Clerk Chávez announced that this was the time and place for the Hearing and that the notice had been legally posted.

City Clerk Chávez announced that no written protests were received.

1) Continue to improve on health community projects/programs at the parks (areas of focus are youth and seniors)

Councilmember Lopez:

- 1) Continue to work on future light rail and high-speed rail projects
- 2) Research grant funding opportunities

Councilmember Fajardo:

- 1) Energy Efficiency:
 - Research the HERO and PACE programs to determine their feasibility for the City
 - Revisit the issue regarding energy efficiency/savings for the City and solicit proposals
- 2) Internship Program:
 - Review and update the City's internship policy/program and offer distinctions between City interns and Council interns (develop a list of available internship positions through the various departments and set criteria for each position)

Mayor Pro Tem Gonzales:

- 1) Continuation of City website upgrade (i.e., make it more business friendly and provide the ability to pay all bills online)
- 2) Bike Path Beautification Project

Mayor Ballin:

- 1) Senior Meal Program
- 2) Heritage Park (i.e., evaluate the best usages for the park including possibly developing the land)

City Manage Saeki reported that staff will compile the priorities/goals, finalize, and email to the City Council for perusal.

Councilmember Avila announced there is an upcoming workshop for City commissioners and he gave an update on the San Fernando Valley Council of Governments activities.

Councilmember Lopez said that the Metro Service Council met last week and it was reported that the Valley's bus service is the best in the County.

Councilmember Fajardo announced that the Tree Commission was cancelled and that the City Council will be revisiting the Commissions (including taking a closer look at the Education Commission).

Mayor Pro Tem Gonzales reported that the Independent Cities Association would be holding a board meeting this week.

City Manager Saeki reported that he and Mayor Ballin attended the Independent Cities Finance Authority (i.e., a pool of 32 cities that share insurance costs) and he provided an update on the meeting and an important decision that was made (thanks to Mayor Ballin).

GENERAL COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Avila said we are moving forward and have been congratulated on the City's choices in the management leadership and he stated that the overall perception is that Council is trying to be more open and inclusive.

Councilmember Lopez thanked everyone at NALEO and said it was a great opportunity to meet Councilmembers from other cities.

Councilmember Fajardo said NALEO was intriguing and showed how functional the Council is compared to other cities and he thanked Executive Assistant Julie Fernandez on the amazing travel brochure she put together for Councilmembers.

Mayor Ballin reported that there would be a Coffee with the Mayor and Assemblymember on July 26, at 9:00 a.m., at Compania coffee shop. In response to her question, City Attorney Olivarez reminded Councilmembers that if three or more attend, only two may answer questions and the others may only listen.

BACKGROUND:

For each City Council meeting the Finance Department prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval. The Register includes all recommended payments for the City. Checks, other than handwritten checks, generally are not released until after the Council approves the Register. The exceptions are for early releases to avoid penalties and interest, excessive delays and in all other circumstances favorable to the City to do so. Handwritten checks are those payments required to be issued between Council meetings such as insurance premiums and tax deposits. Staff reviews requests for expenditures for budgetary approval and then prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval and or ratification. Items such as payroll withholding tax deposits do not require budget approval.

The Finance Director hereby certifies that all requests for expenditures have been signed by the department head, or designee, receiving the merchandise or services thereby stating that the items or services have been received and that the resulting expenditure is appropriate. Determinations

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 7625 (Attachment "A") delegating authority of disability retirement determination of local safety members to the City Manager.

BACKGROUND:

The Public Employees' Retirement Law requires the City to determine whether a safety employee is disabled, and whether such disability is industrial within the meaning of such law. In accordance with Section 21173 of the Government Code, and pursuant to CalPERS provisions, the City Council may delegate the authority to make such determinations to the City Manager.

Prior to June 7, 2004, such determinations were made after the City Disability Committee, which consisted of the Mayor (or designated Councilmember), the City Administrator, the Finance Director and the Personnel Manager, had reviewed medical and other relevant evidence.

On June 7, 2004, the City Council approved the delegation of the authority to make such determinations to the City Administrator by adopting a CalPERS-recommended Resolution. However, as a result of the recent change in the City's administrative structure from a City Administrator form of government to that of a City Manager, adoption of Resolution No. 7625 is necessary to change the title on the Resolution from "City Administrator" to "City Manager."

ANALYSIS:

This Resolution authorizes the City Manager to certify to CalPERS on behalf of the City that a local safety member is industrially or non-industrially disabled, and to make applications to CalPERS for

the disability retirement of the member. Such determinations are made strictly based on CalPERS stipulations and guidelines.

BUDGET IMPACT:

None.

CONCLUSION:

Adoption of Resolution No. 7625 is necessary to streamline the disability retirement process and help reduce Workers' Compensation costs by promptly retiring police officers who have been medically determined as incapable of performing police work.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DELEGATING AUTHORITY FOR DISABILITY RETIREMENT DETERMINATIONS

(Section 21173, Government Code)

WHEREAS, the City of San Fernando (hereinafter referred to as "Agency") is a contracting agency of the Public Employees' Retirement System;

WHEREAS, the Public Employees' Retirement Law requires that a contracting agency determine whether an employee of such agency in employment in which he or she is classified as a local safety member is disabled for purposes of the Public Employees' Retirement Law and whether such disability is "industrial" within the meaning of such Law;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of San Fernando has determined upon legal advice that it may delegate authority under section 21173 of the Government Code to make such determinations to the incumbent of the office/position of City Manager;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, FIND, DETERMINE, AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** The City Council hereby delegates to the incumbent of the office/position of City Manager authority to make determinations under section 21152(c), Government Code, on behalf of the Agency, of disability and whether such disability is industrial and to certify such determinations and all other necessary information to the Public Employees' Retirement System; and
- **Section 2.** Such incumbent be and he/she is authorized to make applications on behalf of the Agency for disability retirement of all employees and to initiate requests for reinstatement of such employees who are retired for disability.

SUBJECT: Update Report Regarding the City's Living Wage Ordinance

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

On April 3, 2000, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1514 (Attachment "A"), implementing a Living Wage Ordinance for the City of San Fernando. The purpose of the Ordinance is to improve the quality and quantity of services received by the City from its service contractors and to promote an economic environment that protects public resources devoted to social support services. Generally, it applies to service contracts entered into by the City for the furnishing of services to, or for, the City and involves the expenditure in excess of \$25,000 for contracts that have a term of at least six months.

Under the Ordinance, employers were initially required to pay a wage of no less than \$7.25 per hour if the employer provided health benefits, or \$8.50 per hour if the employer did not provide health benefits. The Ordinance also requires that employers provided at least six compensated days off per year for sick leave, vacation, or personal necessity at the employee's request and at least six uncompensated days off per year for sick leave for the illness of the employee or a member of his or her immediate family where the employee has exhausted his or her compensated days off for the year.

The Ordinance requires the Living Wage to be adjusted annually by the City's Purchasing Agent to correspond with any adjustments to retirement benefits paid to members of the California Public Employment Retirement System (PERS). In 2006, the City Attorney advised that the City's Purchasing Agent was the City Administrator (now City Manager) and the adjustments to the Living Wage are based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI) adjustments that San Fernando PERS retirees receive on an annual basis, with a maximum of 5%.

Update Report Regarding the City Living Wage Ordinance Page 2

In 2010, the City's adjusted Living Wage hourly rate was \$18.13 per hour with employer provided health benefits. However, a review by staff determined that an incorrect methodology was employed in 2010 to establish the Living Wage rate. Staff recalculated the rate based on the methodology prescribed in the Ordinance and confirmed by the City Attorney. The corrected Living Wage rate, effective July 1, 2013, is \$10.56 per hour with employer provided health benefits, or \$11.81 without employer provided health benefits.

ANALYSIS:

As the Purchasing Agent, the City Manager shall annually adjust the rate of the Living Wage, which shall be effective upon publication of a bulletin announcing such adjustment and shall apply prospectively.

Staff has recalculated the Living Wage rate based on the methodology prescribed in the Ordinance and updated the information based on the recent 2.1% CPI adjustment for San Fernando PERS retirees. The new rate, effective upon publication of a bulletin, will be \$10.64 per hour with employer provided health benefits, or \$11.89 per hour without employer provided benefits. Please refer to Attachment "B" for additional detail regarding the calculation of San Fernando's Living Wage rate.

BUDGET IMPACT:

This annual adjustment will have a minimal impact on the City's budget as many service contracts either exceed the Living Wage or include a CPI escalator to compensate the contractor for cost increases. However, staff will review existing service contracts that fall within the parameters of the City's Living Wage Ordinance and notify contractors of the requirement.

CONCLUSION:

It is the City Manager's responsibility to annually update, as necessary, the City's Living Wage rate, which was last updated in 2013. Staff will publish a bulletin noticing the new rate as required by the Ordinance, determine which service contracts are currently subject to the Living Wage requirement, and ensure that any existing and new service contracts incorporate the applicable Living Wage hourly rate.

ORDINANCE NO. 1514

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO REGARDING PAYMENT OF A LIVING WAGE AND AMENDING THE SAN FERNANDO CITY CODE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Findings and Intent.

- A. The City of San Fernando contracts with numerous private firms for the provision of services to, and for, the City. Many of these service contractors pay their employees wages in an amount at, or slightly above, the minimum required by federal and state law.
- B. The quantity and quality of services that the City receives from its service contractors is directly related to the compensation that such firms pay their employees. Those service contractors that underpay their employees tend to experience high employee absenteeism and turnover, as well as lackluster performance.
- C. The demand for government social services is impacted by the compensation that the City's service contractors pay their employees. Those employees compensated at minimum wage levels, with little or no health benefits, frequently rely on public funds and personnel for assistance.
- D. In enacting this Ordinance, the City intends to require its service contractors to pay those employees performing City-related work the living wage and benefits designated herein. The purpose of this Ordinance is to improve the quantity and quality of services received by the City from its service contractors. It is also the purpose of this Ordinance to promote an economic environment that protects public resources devoted to social support services.
- E. The City awards a significant amount of grant funds under programs created by the federal and state governments. The City Council intends that the regulations contained in this Ordinance shall apply to recipients of such funds to the extent allowed by law.
- Section 2. Chapter 21A ("Purchasing") of the San Fernando City Code is hereby amended by adding a new Article V to read as follows:

"ARTICLE V. LIVING WAGE

Sec. 21A.29. Purpose and short title.

This article is enacted for the purpose of improving the quantity and quality of services received by the City from its service contractors. It is also the purpose of this article to promote an economic environment that protects public resources devoted to social support services. This article shall be known as the Living Wage Ordinance of the City.

Sec. 21A.30. Definitions.

For the purpose of this part, unless it is plainly evident from the context that a different meaning is intended, the following definitions shall apply:

Aid recipient. Any person that is awarded a grant by the City.

Contractor. Any person that enters into a service contract with the City.

Employee. Any person that both: (i) is employed by an employer or a temporary employment agency; and (ii) expends any of his or her time in the performance of work related to a service contract. "Employee" shall not include managerial, supervisory, and confidential personnel. "Employee" also shall not include persons required to possess an occupational license.

Employer. Any contractor or subcontractor. "Employer" shall not include government entities, exempt non-profit organizations or temporary employment agencies.

Exempt non-profit organization. A corporation that both: (i) is organized under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3); and (ii) has a chief executive officer who earns a salary that, when calculated on an hourly basis, is less than eight (8) times the lowest wage paid by the corporation.

Grant. Any discrete financial assistance awarded by the City in connection with a program funded by the federal or state government.

Service contract. A contract that: (i) is let to a contractor by the City primarily for the furnishing of services to, or for, the City; (ii) involves an expenditure in excess of Twenty five thousand (25,000) dollars and (iii) has a term of at least $\underline{\text{six}}$ (6) months.

Subcontractor. Any person that enters into a contract with a contractor to assist the contractor in the performance of a service contract. "Subcontractor" shall not include any person that is an employee of a contractor.

Temporary employment agency. A contractor that, on a temporary basis, provides the City with one or more employees that work under the City's direction.

Sec. 21A.31. Payment of living wage and benefits.

- (a) Wages. Employers shall pay employees a wage of no less than the living wage set pursuant to paragraph (d) of this section. Temporary employment agencies shall pay employees a wage of no less than \$7.25 per hour.
- (b) Compensated days off. Employers shall provide at least \underline{six} (6) compensated days off per year for sick leave, vacation, or personal necessity at the employee's request.
- (c) Uncompensated days off. Employers shall provide employees at least \underline{six} (6) uncompensated days off per year for sick leave for the illness of the employee or a member of his or her immediate family where the employee has exhausted his or her compensated days off for that year.
- (d) Living wage rate. The initial rate of the living wage shall be: (i) \$7.25 per hour with health benefits, as described in paragraph (e) of this section; or (ii) \$8.50 per hour without health benefits, as described in paragraph (e) of this section. As necessary, the purchasing agent shall annually adjust the rate of the living wage to correspond with any adjustments to retirement benefits paid to members of the California Public Employment Retirement System. The adjustment of the living wage rate shall be effective upon publication by the purchasing agent of a bulletin announcing such adjustment and shall apply prospectively.

(e) Health benefits. Health benefits required by this article shall consist of the payment of at least $\frac{$1.25}{}$ per hour towards the provision of health care benefits for employees and their dependents. Proof of the provision of such benefits must be submitted to the purchasing agent to qualify for the wage rate in paragraph (d) of this section for employees with health benefits.

Sec. 21A.32. Federal earned income credit notification.

Employers shall inform employees making less than twelve (\$12.00) dollars per hour of their possible right to the federal Earned Income Credit ("EIC") provided for in 26 United States Code Section 32. Employers shall make available to employees forms describing the EIC, as well as forms required to secure advance EIC payments from the employer.

Sec. 21A.33. Grounds for contract termination.

All service contracts shall provide that violation of this article shall entitle the City to terminate the contract and otherwise pursue legal remedies that may be available.

Sec. 21A.34. Compliance by aid recipients.

Aid recipients who are awarded a grant in excess of twenty five thousand shall comply with the requirements for employers that are set forth in this article.

Sec. 21A.35. Applicability.

- (a) General. Except as provided in this section, the provisions of this article shall apply to: (i) employers and temporary employment agencies with whom the City executes a service contract after the effective date of this article; (ii) employers and temporary employment agencies with whom the City executes an amendment to a service contract existing on the effective date of this article; and (iii) aid recipients to whom the City awards a grant after the effective date of this article.
- (b) Inapplicable to employers when waiver issued. This article shall not apply to any person that has been issued a waiver pursuant to paragraph (c) of this section.

- (c) Waiver authorization. The purchasing agent, with the consent of the City Council, may issue a waiver of the requirements of this article to any person submitting a bid for a service contract upon making a finding that such waiver is necessary to allow the person to compete fairly in the bidding process.
- (d) Inapplicable to recipients of restricted grants. This article shall not apply to aid recipients unless the city attorney either: (i) determines that application of this article is consonant with the laws governing the award of the particular grant; or (ii) receives a judgment from a court of law, or other tribunal, that indicates application of this article is consonant with the laws governing the award of the particular grant.

Sec. 21A.36. Administration.

- (a) Implementation regulations. The purchasing agent shall promulgate implementing regulations consistent with this article. At a minimum, such regulations shall include the following: (i) a list of contracts that shall be regarded as service contracts for purposes of Section 21A.30; and (ii) requirements for employer reporting of employee compensation.
- (b) Compliance monitoring. The purchasing agent shall monitor compliance with this article. Such monitoring shall include investigation of complaints of claimed violations by employees. The purchasing agent shall annually submit to the city council a written report on compliance with this article.

Sec. 21A.37. Notifying Employees

Employers shall give written notification to each current and new employee of his or her rights to receive the benefits set forth in this article. The notification shall be provided in English, Spanish, and other languages spoken by a significant number of employees, and shall be posted prominently in communal areas at the work site.

Sec. 21A.38. Enforcement.

(a) Any aggrieved person may enforce the provisions of this article by means of a civil action.

- (b) Any person who violates the provisions of this article or who aids in the violation of any provisions of this article shall be liable for, and the court shall award to the individual whose rights are violated, the following: actual damages; costs; attorney's fees; and not less than two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars but not more than ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars in addition thereto. In addition, the court may award punitive damages in a proper case.
- (c) Actions to enforce the provisions of this article must be filed within one (1) year of the alleged violation.
- (d) Nothing in this article shall preclude any aggrieved person from seeking any other remedy provided by law.
- (e) Nothing in this article shall be construed to limit any aggrieved person's right to bring legal action for violation of other minimum compensation laws.

Sec. 21A.39. No criminal penalty.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Code or any other ordinance to the contrary, no criminal penalties shall attach for any violation of this article."

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Declare all the items on the Surplus City-Owned Personal Property List (Attachment "A") as surplus; and
- b. Authorize the City Manager to dispose of surplus City-owned personal property in accordance with Chapter 2, Article VI, Division 7, of the City of San Fernando Municipal Code.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. Periodically, the City retires equipment as surplus City-owned personal property, which requires a formal disposition.
- 2. The City has a Vehicle Replacement Program in place, which strategically rotates out older, damaged or non-functional vehicles and other rolling equipment from the City's fleet.
- 3. In May 2013, the City Council last approved disposition of equipment including 15 vehicles.

ANALYSIS:

The City currently has seven pieces of rolling inventory and one small piece of equipment stored at the City Yard ready for auction. Staff is requesting approval to have these items available for an on-line auction as per Chapter 2 – Administration, Article VI – Finance, Division 7. Surplus

City-Owned Personal Property Sec. 2-869. Bids; Sales; Exchanges of the San Fernando Municipal Code. All equipment will be sold "as-is". After approval they will be available for inspection for a period of one week.

The equipment listed will be disposed of by sale to the highest bidder, or by public auction sales. They will be auctioned off to the public. The Public Works Department will prepare the "release of liability" forms and will handle all necessary transfer of ownership. All necessary registration and smog inspections will be the new owners' responsibility.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Proceeds from the disposal of surplus City-owned personal property will be determined after the completion of the auction. Proceeds will be deposited in the General Fund.

CONCLUSION:

All vehicles and equipment shall be sold or auctioned in "as is" condition; the City shall provide no warranty and assume no liability for the condition or use of items sold or auctioned. Staff requests City Council approval of the sale of the surplus equipment and inventory.

SUBJECT: Notice of Completion for Sign Installation Project

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Accept the improvements as constructed by FS Construction and consider the work complete;
- b. Authorize the issuance and filing of the "Notice of Completion" (Attachment "A") with the Los Angeles County Office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk; and
- c. Authorize the release of the 5% retention amount (\$1,858) after the 35-day lien period from the date the Notice of Completion is recorded.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In August 2013, City issued a Notice Inviting Bids and awarded a contract to LNI Custom Manufacturing, Inc. for the fabrication of the new way-finding signs.
- 2. In October 2013, the Public Works Department issued a Notice Inviting Bids to install the way-finding signs and mast arm street name signs. On November 19, 2013, the City received three bids in response to the NIB.
- 3. On December 2, 2013, the City Council awarded a sign installation contract (Contract No. 1728) to FS Construction (Contractor) in the amount of \$35,960 and authorized the City Manager to approve change orders not to exceed 10% of contract amount.
- 4. The installation work started in January 2014 and work was completed June 30, 2014.

ANALYSIS:

The sign installation project included 27 directional signs to major points of interest within the City of San Fernando, two City entrance signs, and 11 parking lot identification signs. Additionally the project included replacement of the mast arm street name signs that will improve readability of street name signs at various locations. Street name signs were removed and replaced at the following intersections:

- 1. South Brand Boulevard at Truman Street
- 2. Pico Street at South Brand Boulevard
- 3. Celis Street at South Brand Boulevard
- 4. San Fernando Road at South Brand Boulevard
- 5. Truman Street at South Brand Boulevard
- 6. San Fernando Road at Hubbard Avenue

While some placement of the signage, as well as the wording on the signage, was not satisfactory, the contractor did complete the project per plans and specifications, as directed by previous City management. As such, any desired corrections are not the responsibility of the contractor. Staff has scheduled the correction work with City crews.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The total construction cost was \$35,960 plus \$1,200 construction change orders, for a total of \$37,160. The installation project was funded by City's Gas Tax Funds and came in under budget by \$2,400.

CONCLUSION:

The Sign Installation Project is now complete. All work has been completed to staff satisfaction and is in conformance with the approved plans and specifications. Project acceptance and filing the Notice of Completion allows for the project to be filed and closed out.

- b. Designate two Alternate Voting Delegates, one of whom may vote in the event that the designated Delegate is unable to serve in that capacity; and

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On May 20, 2013, the City Council designated (then) Mayor Antonio Lopez as the Voting Delegate for the 2013 League of California Cities Annual Conference and Councilmembers Robert Gonzales and Jesse Avila as the Alternate Voting Delegates.
- 2. The League 2014 Annual Conference is scheduled for September 3–5, 2014, in Los Angeles, California. An important part of the Annual Conference is the Annual Business Meeting; at this meeting, the League membership considers and takes action on resolutions that establish League policy.
- 3. On May 5, 2014, the City Council approved Mayor Ballin's recommended appointments to the City Council Liaison Assignments 2014-2015, which included appointing Councilmember Lopez as the City Council Liaison to the League of California Cities and Councilmember Fajardo as the Alternate.

ANALYSIS:

Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to League policy. In order to vote at the Annual Business Meeting, the City Council must designate a Voting Delegate, and may also appoint up to two alternate Voting Delegates, one of whom may vote in the event that the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity.

Consistent with League bylaws, the City's Voting Delegate (and up to two Alternate Voting Delegates) must be designated by the City Council via either resolution or by City Council action; Voting Delegates may not be appointed by individual action of the Mayor or City Manager/Administrator alone (Attachment "B").

The Voting Delegate and Alternates must be registered to attend the Conference; they do not need to register for the entire conference, they may register for Friday only. A Voting Delegate Card will be issued and may be transferred freely between the Voting Delegate and the Alternates; however, it may not be transferred to another City official.

CONCLUSION:

Annual Conference Voting Procedures 2014 Annual Conference

- 1. **One City One Vote.** Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to League policy.
- 2. **Designating a City Voting Representative.** Prior to the Annual Conference, each city council may designate a voting delegate and up to two alternates; these individuals are identified on the Voting Delegate Form provided to the League Credentials Committee.
- 3. **Registering with the Credentials Committee.** The voting delegate, or alternates, may pick up the city's voting card at the Voting Delegate Desk in the conference registration area. Voting delegates and alternates must sign in at the Voting Delegate Desk. Here they will receive a special sticker on their name badge and thus be admitted to the voting area at the Business Meeting.
- 4. **Signing Initiated Resolution Petitions**. Only those individuals who are voting delegates (or alternates), and who have picked up their city's voting card by providing a signature to the Credentials Committee at the Voting Delegate Desk, may sign petitions to initiate a resolution.
- 5. **Voting.** To cast the city's vote, a city official must have in his or her possession the city's voting card and be registered with the Credentials Committee. The voting card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates, but may not be transferred to another city official who is neither a voting delegate or alternate.
- 6. **Voting Area at Business Meeting.** At the Business Meeting, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission will be limited to those individuals with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate or alternate.

Transportation Authority (Metro) Rapid Bus Shelters Implementation Program

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council

- a. Approve participation in the Metro Rapid Bus Shelter Implementation Program for the design, purchase and installation of four bus stops on Truman Street, at no cost to the City, and
- b. Authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute the Metro Implementation Agreement, upon City Attorney review and approval as to form.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) developed a bus rapid transit service (LA Metro Rapid) to reduce passenger travel times and create a more rail-like service.
- 2. The Metro Board authorized funds to expand the program from two demonstration Rapid lines to the 24 lines currently operating countywide. This will include more than 900 bus stops.
- 3. Metro has identified a bus stop design and enhanced stations/shelters that will be fully funded and constructed by Metro. To-date Metro staff has met with more than 20 local jurisdictions to discuss Rapid shelter implementation.
- 4. Metro currently has four Rapid bus stops in the City of San Fernando on Truman Street.

ANALYSIS:

The LA Metro Rapid service attributes include: frequent service, fewer stops, branded buses and stations/shelters, transit signal priority, and passenger information. The implementation program investment in the new LA Metro Rapid bus stops/shelters is estimated to be up to \$30,000 per stop. The bus shelter design details and amenities are provided herein as Attachment "A". The \$30,000 budget per stop will include reimbursements to the City of \$2,500 per stop for plan review and construction inspection, and up to \$1,000 per stop for bus shelter removal.

The City's four bus stop locations on Truman Street are provided as Attachment "B". The bus stops include two bus shelters and two bus benches as shown on Attachment "C". Should the City Council choose to participate in this program, staff is estimating approximately \$13,000 for City reimbursements and over \$100,000 in design, engineering, and construction costs for Metro regarding the four City stops.

The Metro project schedule for the first phase of implementation is estimated to include: three months for design and engineering, six months for the Request for Proposal (RFP)/bid process, and six months for purchase and installation. Completion is expected by December 2015. Those cities first to approve participation will be included in the first phase of implementation.

BUDGET IMPACT:

None.

CONCLUSION:








Line: Metro Rapid 794 San Fernando/734 Lankershim

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve City staff and the Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Overlay Zone Ad Hoc Committee's recommendation for the proposed make-up of the Development Ad Hoc Committee (DAC) as noted in Attachment "A".

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In June 2012, the Los Angeles Metropolitan Transit Authority (Metro) Board released an application for Round 3 of the TOD Planning Grant Program with a maximum funding of \$10 million. The TOD program is intended to encourage cities along major transit corridors such as the Metrolink Railway to make regulatory changes necessary to facilitate infill and transit oriented development projects that are consistent with regional transportation plans. The Metro received 15 applications totaling \$17,719,222 in requested funds. All applications were evaluated and 13 were approved for a total grant award of \$9,443,997.
- 2. On February 28, 2013, the Metro Board approved the City of San Fernando TOD Overlay Zone Project and awarded the City a grant of \$282,392, which includes a requirement of a \$13,306 minimum City match in the form of \$6,306 in in-kind contribution (i.e., staff time) and \$7,000 in monies. The City contribution would equal 4.5% of the total estimated Project cost of \$295,698. Per the grant requirements, the City TOD Overlay Zone, General Plan Amendment and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) must be completed by June 30, 2016.
- 3. On May 6, 2013, the City Council authorized Interim City Administrator Don Penman to enter into an agreement with Metro accepting \$282,392 in Metro TOD Planning Grant Award funds to prepare the City of San Fernando TOD Overlay Zone Project, inclusive of the Zone Code and General Plan Amendment and associated EIR. As part of the Agreement,

the City also agreed to provide a \$13,306 match that included \$6,306 in-kind contribution and \$7,000 in General Fund; collectively bringing the total estimated cost of the Project to \$295,698.

- 4. On November 18, 2013, the Community Development Department issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Consultant Services to Prepare the San Fernando Transit Oriented Development Overlay Zone (the Project).
- 5. On December 19, 2013, the City received RFPs from prospective planning firms to undertake the Project. The following firms submitted a proposal by the noted deadline:
 - Blodgett Baylosis Associates
 - Dyett & Bhatia
 - Evan Brooks and Associates
- RBF Consulting
- Sargent Town Planning
- 6. On April 25, 2014, City Council Ad Hoc Committee Members Jesse Avila and Antonio Lopez and Community Development Director Ramirez conducted interviews of the four prospective firms seeking to undertake the Project including the preparation of the TOD Overlay Zone, General Plan Amendment, and Program EIR.
- 7. On May 19, 2014, the City Council approved a Professional Services Agreement with Sargent Town Planning to Prepare the City of San Fernando Transit Oriented Development Overlay (TOD) Zone.
- 8. On July 22, 2014, City staff met with the consultant team from Sargent Town Planning to discuss the possible make-up of the DAC and the need to establish the DAC during the month of August 2014 in order to facilitate future public meetings as part of the revised TOD Overlay Zone Project's Schedule (Attachment "B").
- 9. On July 28, 2014, City staff met with the TOD Overlay Zone Project Ad Hoc Committee and discussed the proposed make-up of the DAC, which included the following members:

- 2 Members of TOD Overlay Zone Project Ad Committee (Councilmembers Avila and Lopez)
- 2 Members of the Planning and Preservation Commission (Chair and Vice Chair)
- Members of the Traffic and Safety Commission (Chair and Vice Chair)
- 2 Property Owners/Development Community Members (Severyn Aszkenazy and Eric Guefen)

DAC Total Size = 11 member committee

Subsequent to discussion, the TOD Overlay Zone Ad Hoc Committee concurred with City staff's recommended make-up of the DAC and directed staff to submit the proposed DAC make-up to the City Council for review and approval at their upcoming August 4, 2014 meeting.

ANALYSIS:

City Council approval of the proposed DAC make-up at this time will facilitate public and stakeholder input on key items needed to establish a vision for the proposed TOD Overlay Zone Project. City staff and the consultant will be meeting throughout the project with the DAC and the general public to review the components of the overlay, urban design diagrams and formatting. The public meetings will include presentations to the DAC and an opportunity to allow participants to express their preferences for the direction of the presented project.

The purpose of these meetings will also be to receive input on key elements of the project, such as land use strategies, urban design proposals, development standards, design guidelines for both public and private areas, and circulation and mobility strategies. Therefore, the DAC will play a critical role in assisting City staff and the consultant team on the preparation of the TOD Overlay Zone Project in a manner that meets the goals and objectives of the community for the overlay zone, which seeks to identify appropriate areas for infill, transit oriented development projects within the designated planning area. The work of the DAC and the resultant TOD Overlay Zone will subsequently be presented to the Planning and Preservation Commission and City Council for their review and approval at separate noticed public hearings.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The cost to formulate the DAC and conduct future public meetings between the DAC, City staff and the consultant team has already been jointly funded by Metro grant funds and City General Funds that were approved by the City Council during the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 City Budget adoption.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends approval of the DAC at this time to allow City staff and the consultant to proceed with the development of the TOD Overlay Zone Project while also ensuring public and stakeholder input on key project components throughout the planning process.



ATTACHMENT "A"

Prop. 13 was meant to protect **people**. That's why voters overwhelmingly supported this law in 1978. However, in the last 35 years, Prop. 13 has benefited large commercial property owners the most.

- Establish regular reassessment of non-residential, commercial property in California. No other state in the country has frozen commercial property tax rates. Most states reassess commercial property every 1-5 years. Given the number and diversity of counties in California, our proposal will leave the frequency of reassessment up to each individual county.
- Maintain current Prop. 13 protections for all residential property. Homeowners, home renters, apartment owners, and apartment renters will not be affected by this reform.
- Provide an exemption for small businesses. A small business owner with gross annual receipts of less than \$2.5 million, or a manufacturer with 25 or fewer employees, will not be affected by this reform.
- Implement this reform in a smart way. Some commercial properties have not been reassessed in 35 years, meaning their owners are still paying property rates based on 1970s assessments. Our proposal will gradually phase-in changes to tax rates. Upon implementation, it will take three years until non-residential, commercial property owners will be paying taxes based on their current market value.

This common sense reform will:

- Decrease the tax burden on working families. Prop. 13's commercial property loophole forces our state, county, and municipal governments to raise funds in other ways. Today, California has the highest income and sales tax in the country, and local governments regularly ask voters to pass regressive parcel taxes to fund vital public services.
- Provide at least \$6 billion a year of desperately needed revenue to our schools and public services. Prior to Prop. 13, California schools ranked in the top ten nationally in per pupil spending, today we rank 49th! Restoring funding to our schools is critical for the future of California and making corporations pay their fair share is the best way to do this.
- Increase California's fiscal stability. Increased reliance on more volatile forms of taxation, like income and sales tax is bad for our economy. The property tax is the most stable form of taxation, which is why it should be a greater source of revenue for state, county and municipal governments.
- Make California's property tax system fairer. In most counties, the property tax burden was equally shared prior to Prop. 13. Since Prop. 13 passed, the property tax burden in California has dramatically shifted from commercial property to residential property. Today, homeowners pay 72% of property taxes, while commercial Properties only pay 28%.
- Create a healthier business climate in California. Prop. 13 is anti-competitive. If a new business buys property across the street from an established business that has owned their property for longer, they are at a competitive disadvantage. Two identical businesses side by side can pay drastically different property tax rates based on when they purchased their property. This does not foster fair competition or encourage new business creation in California.

Corporations get big edge in Prop. 13 quirk

In 2006, billionaire computer magnate Michael Dell, one of the world's richest men, agreed to pay \$200 million for the Fairmont Miramar Hotel, a beachfront landmark in Santa Monica that long has been a retreat for Hollywood starlets and U.S. presidents.

A few months later, Dell tore up the contract. He still wanted the hotel. But his attorneys had found a simple way to reshuffle the deal to avoid a legal change in ownership.

The maneuver saved about \$1 million a year in property taxes -- an option available only to businesses, not homeowners, under the arcane rules governing Proposition 13.

The Miramar deal illustrates how businesses can easily -- and legally -- avoid property tax hikes under the California ballot initiative passed in 1978. As a result, the state loses tens of millions of dollars in revenue each year, officials estimate.

Voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 13 out of a concern that homeowners, particularly the elderly, would be forced from their houses by rising tax bills during a real estate boom. The law ensured that property taxes were pegged at 1% of purchase price, assessed value could rise no more than 2% per year, and property was reassessed to full market value only when sold.

But large corporate property owners have been among the law's biggest beneficiaries, thanks in part to loopholes such as the one Dell used.

Essentially, the law allows businesses to sidestep reassessment if no one acquires a majority stake in a company that owns the property. Dell did that by bringing in his wife and two of his investment advisors as partners -- with no one taking more than 49% control of the hotel company. With no change in ownership, it continued to be taxed based on the 1999 property value of \$86 million.

Los Angeles County assessors concluded it was a blatant tax dodge and raised taxes on the property.

A Superior Court judge disagreed, finding last December that the deal met the letter of the law. The county has filed an appeal.

Dell declined to comment. If he prevails, he will save more than \$1 million a year, and taxpayers will probably also owe him more than \$2 million in tax refunds and legal fees.

Christopher Thornberg, founder of research firm Beacon Economics and a former economist at UCLA Anderson Forecast, says the state has only itself to blame: "He didn't do anything wrong. He's saying to California: Look, idiots, I just robbed you blind, and it's your own fault."

Shifting tax burden

Passed 35 years ago by more than 65% of voters, Proposition 13 remains highly popular among property owners.

But during that period, the tax burden has steadily shifted from businesses to homeowners. In Los Angeles County, for instance, homeowners have gone from paying a 40% share of the total in 1975 to 57% today.

That shift is fueling efforts by some Democrats to tinker with Proposition 13. Eight separate measures were introduced this session. One, intended to close the loophole used by Dell, was recently tabled amid complaints by businesses that it was "a job killer." The others remain long shots.

Public support is growing, however, for a more sweeping change. A December poll by the Public Policy Institute of California found that 58% of likely voters favor a so-called split roll, in which commercial properties would be reassessed periodically regardless of their ownership.

The change would require a popular vote to amend Proposition 13, which is enshrined in the state Constitution, and would probably meet a wall of opposition from business owners, who complain they are overtaxed in California as it is.

For now, state and local officials are bound by rules that even some architects of Proposition 13 warned were ripe for abuse.

A year after Proposition 13 passed, state leaders began to grapple with the meaning of three words in the initiative: "change of ownership."

In the case of a single-family home, the change is obvious: A new deed is filed with the county recorder, triggering a reassessment. The property is then taxed based on its current market value.

But the transfer of business properties is more complex. What changes hands often is not the property but control of the legal entity -- a corporation, limited liability company or limited partnership -- that owns the real estate. In those cases, no new deed is filed.

A legislative task force searched for a bright line signaling a transfer and concluded that there were only two choices.

One was to require reassessment when a new company bought the property outright. The limitation of that was that it would capture too few transactions. The other method would require it when a single person or entity took control of more than 50% of a company that owned the property -- the majority-ownership rule.

Adopting the majority-ownership rule would lead to "monumental" enforcement problems, the task force warned: "No one, no matter how skilled and imaginative, can foresee ... every possible form of real property transfer."

But the Legislature adopted it anyway, concluding it was the better of two imperfect solutions.

Today, the Board of Equalization relies on businesses to accurately disclose changes in majority ownership. Assessors sometimes scan newspapers for big deals the board might have missed.

Often, buyers take majority ownership because other business advantages outweigh the tax benefit.

But the Miramar deal is not the only instance in which a wealthy buyer has used the majority-ownership loophole to save millions.

In 2002, E&J Gallo, the world's biggest winemaker, purchased Louis M. Martini, which owned more than 1,000 acres of prime Napa and Sonoma County vineyards. None of the property was reassessed because Martini was divided among 12 Gallo family members, none of whom acquired more than 50%.

Some of that property today is worth more than \$150,000 an acre but continues to be taxed based on its 1975 value of a few thousand dollars an acre, according to Napa County assessor John Tuteur.

In 1998, a Canadian skiing conglomerate bought 58% of Mammoth Mountain resort, which had been family-owned for years.

The new owner, Intrawest Corp., argued that the property should not be reassessed because the deal did not give it a majority of the voting rights in the company.

The county assessor concluded that challenging the ski resort in court would be too costly.

In 2005, it changed hands again. This time, the buyer bought majority control and paid for it in property taxes: The assessed value almost doubled, bringing in an additional \$1 million in annual revenue for Mono County.

Texas tax fight

At the time Dell bid for the Miramar hotel with its 10-story tower and poolside bungalows, Forbes listed him as the 12th-wealthiest person in the world. His fortune was estimated at \$17 billion.

He had never been a fan of property taxes. In the 1990s, Dell had a protracted fight with the city of Austin over the value of his 22,000-square-foot mansion.

The county appraised its value at \$22.5 million, but Dell appealed, arguing it was worth \$6 million at most. Eventually the two sides settled upon a value of \$12 million.

In 2006, Dell reduced the annual tax bill on his Texas ranch from \$580,000 to \$1,300 by qualifying for a wildlife exemption, which required him to feed wild turkeys and hunt white-tailed deer on the 1,700-acre property outside Austin.

He bid that same year for the Santa Monica hotel.

After discarding the first contract, Dell arranged for three partners to buy Ocean Avenue LLC, the holding company that owned the hotel. A firm owned by Dell acquired 42.5%. His wife Susan's trust acquired 49%. And a company set up by two of Dell's investment managers acquired the remaining 8.5%.

Dell reported to state tax officials that there had been no change in ownership. The Los Angeles County assessor's office learned of the deal after reading about it in The Times.

Staff members asked a lawyer at the Board of Equalization whether they could consider the deal a change in ownership. When the answer was no, the county decided to reassess anyway and raised the hotel's taxes.

In a hearing before the Assessment Appeals board, county counsel Albert Ramseyer argued that the Dells plainly took control of the property from the seller. He urged the board to "use common sense."

Dell lawyer Christopher Matarese responded that common sense is not the standard. He pointed to Revenue and Taxation Code section 462.180(d)(s), which says that a husband and wife can acquire 100% control of a property with no change of ownership as long as they split it 50-50.

"This court should not undo almost 40 years of change in ownership legislation because the assessor thinks the law is 'too good to be true,'" argued Matarese.

In December 2010, the Assessment Appeals Board ruled for the county, concluding Dell retained "ultimate control" of the hotel and had concocted the partnership to avoid reassessment.

Dell took the county to Superior Court. Five months ago, Judge Joanne B. O'Donnell struck down each of the assessor's arguments and ordered the county to refund his taxes and pay Dell's legal fees.

As Los Angeles County pursues its appeal, Dell's team has announced new plans for the Miramar: a massive remodel that would a dd a 21-story tower, making it Santa Monica's second-tallest building.

Local activists flooded a recent City Council meeting to object, saying it would turn Santa Monica into Miami Beach.

To bring neighbors around, Dell's team has touted the economic benefits of the plan, saying it would "generate important new revenue for Santa Monica ... money that will support our police, fire, schools and parks."

RESOLUTION NO. 7626

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO SUPPORTING COMMERCIAL PROPERTY TAX REFORM

WHEREAS, Proposition 13, passed in 1978, is unfair in that it allows commercial property owners to avoid paying their fair share and has shifted the tax burden to residential property and away from business, including everyday homeowners and working families; and

WHEREAS, the state of California continues to face chronic budget crises in large part because Proposition 13 has forced the state to rely on more volatile revenue sources than the property tax, like income taxes and sales taxes paid by working families that move in tandem with economic cycles, causing deficits and requiring cuts to vital services that grow our economy and thereby worsening economic downturns; and

WHEREAS, regularly reassessing non-residential property would, according to an analysis of data provided by the California Board of Equalization, generate at least \$6 billion in additional revenue for California, and shift the tax burden from homeowners, renters, and working families to corporations and commercial landholders.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the San Fernando City Council supports commercial property tax reform that will require non-residential commercial properties to be reassessed regularly while maintaining Proposition 13 protections for residential property and small business owners; and

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the San Fernando City Council will communicate this position to local elected officials.
