RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

Each month at the City of San Fernando Transportation and Public Safety Commission meeting, the Police Department submits and provides the governing board a brief overview of the previous month's community engagement activities, noteworthy incidents, and proactive enforcement.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) has recently heightened and further integrated its community profile in three major areas: Community Engagement, Proactive Enforcement and Quality of Life Enhancements.

For the month of June 2025, the SFPD has the following activities and incidents to report:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

1. San Fernando Middle School and San Fernando Institute for Applied Media Parent Academy On Wednesday, June 4, 2025, from 5:30 to 7:30 PM, the San Fernando Police Department and San Fernando Middle School hosted a culmination ceremony for participants of the Spring program. This program was created to support parents and community members by providing information about city government, offering parenting resources, and giving attendees the opportunity to engage directly with school and community leaders to have their questions answered.

2. Community Meeting

On Wednesday, June 11, 2025, Chief Valdez and Commander Chiasson attended a community meeting to address concerns raised by community members on a variety of topics.

3. ABC Minor Decoy Operation

On Tuesday, June 17 and Wednesday, June 25, 2025, SFPD Detectives and California Department of Alcoholic Beverage control conducted Minor Decoy Operations at various alcohol sales locations throughout the City.

4. Neighborhood Watch Meeting

The monthly Neighborhood Watch Meeting was held on Wednesday, June 18, 2025 in the City Council Chambers. Detective Cervantes discussed May Part 1 Crime statistics and responded to questions and community concerns from participants.

5. Business Watch Meeting.

The monthly Business Watch Meeting was held on Wednesday, June 25, 2025 in the City Council Chambers. Detective Cervantes discussed May Part 1 Crime statistics and responded to questions and community concerns from participants.

NOTEWORTHY EVENTS:

- 1. On Tuesday, June 3, 2025, around 1:10 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a possible burglary in progress in the 14000 Block of Harvest Moon Drive. Following their investigation, they arrested a male subject for trespassing.
- 2. On Thursday, June 5, 2025, at approximately 10:50 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of structure fire in the 600 Block of North Maclay Avenue. LAFD responded to the scene, extinguished the fire and declared the home uninhabitable. The SFPD Chaplain, Hope the Mission, and the Red Cross assisted displaced families.
- 3. On Friday, June 6, 2025 around 1:20 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic stop of a vehicle in the area of Bradley Avenue and Sayre Street. The driver displayed signs of alcohol intoxication and was detained for a DUI investigation. During the investigation, officers found six baggies of cocaine on the front seat of the vehicle and arrested the driver for possession of a controlled substance.
- 4. On Saturday, June 7, 2025 at approximately 2:35 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a trespasser on the roof of a building in the 900 Block of San Fernando Road. The male subject fled on foot but was apprehended after a brief pursuit. He was arrested for methamphetamine possession, an outstanding warrant, and a parole hold.
- 5. On Saturday, June 7 2025, at about 9:50 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic enforcement stop in the area of Foothill Boulevard and Maclay Street. Following an investigation, he arrested the driver for possession of methamphetamine and outstanding warrants.
- 6. On Saturday, June 7, 2025 around 11:50 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a domestic dispute in the 800 Block of North Brand Boulevard. They arrested a male subject for violating a restraining order.

- 7. On Sunday, June 8, 2025, at approximately 1:30 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a single vehicle collision of a vehicle that was doing donuts in the area of Hollister Street and South Workman Street. Following an investigation, the officers arrested a 17-year-old male subject for DUI.
- 8. On Monday, June 9, 2025, around 1:10 AM, SFPD officers stopped a vehicle for an illegal Uturn near Truman Avenue and Maclay Avenue. The driver was arrested for an outstanding warrant related to illegal fireworks.
- 9. On Monday, June 9, 2025, at about 10:30 AM, four SFPD officers responded to a mutual aid request to assist LAPD with civil unrest.
- 10. On Thursday, June 12, 2025, at approximately 8:30 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of drug use near the Bike Path and Orange Grove Avenue. A male subject admitted to possessing methamphetamine and a pipe. He was arrested for drug possession and paraphernalia.
- 11. On Sunday, June 15, around 2:00 AM, SFPD officers stopped a vehicle after observing the driver inhaling nitrous oxide. A search revealed a semi-automatic handgun, cocaine, mushrooms, drug packaging materials, and nitrous oxide. The driver was arrested for multiple narcotics and firearms violations.
- 12. On Tuesday, June 17, 2025, at approximately 11:00 PM, an SFPD officer stopped a motorhome parked in the roadway. The driver had a suspended license and an outstanding warrant. He was arrested for the warrant and possession of methamphetamine.
- 13. On Sunday, June 22, 2025, at approximately 4:30 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a domestic dispute in the 300 block of Harps Street. Upon arrival, they contacted two females and two male subjects, one of whom was a minor. Officers arrested three adults for child endangerment and contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and the juvenile for child endangerment.
- 14. On Monday, June 23, 2025, at around 1:00 AM, SFPD officers attempted a traffic stop near San Fernando Mission Boulevard and Woodworth Street. The vehicle failed to yield, resulting in a brief pursuit that ended in the 1000 block of O'Melveny Avenue. The driver was arrested for felony evading and driving under the influence of alcohol.
- 15. On Monday, June 23, 2025, at approximately 8:50 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle that failed to stop at a stop sign. The driver was arrested for an outstanding warrant and issued a citation for the stop sign violation and expired vehicle registration.
- 16. On Monday, June 23, 2025, at about 7:00 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a suspicious vehicle in the 300 block of San Fernando Mission Boulevard. They located a subject

inside the vehicle inhaling nitrous oxide from a balloon. One male was arrested for possession of nitrous oxide and a controlled substance, and a second subject was cited for a misdemeanor offense.

- 17. On Tuesday, June 24, 2025, at approximately 11:45 PM, SFPD officers received a Flock alert regarding a stolen vehicle in the area of Glenoaks Boulevard and Arroyo Avenue. Officers located the vehicle, and the driver fled on foot near Dronfield Avenue and Osborne Street. The suspect was detained and arrested for auto theft and an outstanding narcotics warrant.
- 18. On Wednesday, June 25, 2025, at approximately 8:00 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic stop near Fifth Street and Park Avenue. The driver was arrested for an outstanding warrant.
- 19. On Wednesday, June 25, 2025, at about 8:10 PM, an SFPD officer attempted to stop a vehicle driving erratically near Old San Fernando Road and Frank Modugno Drive. The driver stopped in a residential driveway near Polk Street and became confrontational. Additional subjects exited the residence and also became confrontational. Three individuals were arrested for battery on a police officer and resisting arrest.



Subject: July 2025 Notable Police Department Events and Activities

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

Each month at the City of San Fernando Transportation and Public Safety Commission meeting, the Police Department submits and provides the governing board a brief overview of the previous month's community engagement activities, noteworthy incidents, and proactive enforcement.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) has recently heightened and further integrated its community profile in three major areas: Community Engagement, Proactive Enforcement and Quality of Life Enhancements.

For the month of July 2025, the SFPD has the following activities and incidents to report:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

1. Community Neighborhood Watch

On Wednesday, July 9, 2025, Detective Jorge Cervantes attended a Spanish-language Community Neighborhood Watch meeting at 528 Harps Street, where he addressed community concerns.

2. Neighborhood Watch Meeting

The monthly Neighborhood Watch meeting was held on Wednesday, July 16, 2025, at 6:00 PM in the City Council Chambers. Detective Sergeant Pete Aguirre addressed participants' concerns and answered questions.

3. Business Watch Meeting

On Wednesday, July 23, 2025, at 12:00 PM, Detective Daniel Delgado attended the monthly Business Watch meeting in the City Council Chambers, where he addressed concerns and answered participants' questions.

4. San Fernando Student Safety Coalition Meeting

On Wednesday, July 23, 2025 at 1:30 PM, Chief Valdez and Detective Cervantes attended the San Fernando Student Safety Coalition Meeting at Recreation Park.

NOTEWORTHY EVENTS:

- 1. On Wednesday, July 2, 2025 at approximately 9:20 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a domestic disturbance in the 400 Block of North Huntington Street. They arrested a male subject for criminal threats.
- 2. On Thursday, July 3, 2025, around 11:30 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of two individuals defacing a wall with graffiti in the 600 Block of San Fernando Road. While being detained, one subject spat in an officer's face and was arrested for vandalism and battery on a police officer. The second subject was arrested for public intoxication.
- 3. On Friday, July 4, 2025, at about 2:20 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a domestic dispute in the 1700 Block of Truman Street. Following an investigation, they arrested a male subject for two outstanding warrants.
- 4. On Friday, July 4, 2025, at approximately 11:40 PM, an SFPD officer observed a vehicle committing multiple traffic violations and weaving through traffic. The officer conducted a traffic stop and observed the driver displaying signs of alcohol intoxication. Following a DUI investigation, the driver was arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol and driving with a blood alcohol content of 0.08% or higher.
- 5. On Friday July 4, 2025, between 6:00 PM and 2:00 AM, SFPD officers responded to 19 reports of illegal fireworks throughout the City.
- 6. On Tuesday, July 8, 2025, around 10:30 PM, SFPD officers conducted a traffic enforcement stop of a vehicle swerving while driving. Following an investigation, they arrested a male subject for DUI and driving without a license.
- 7. On Wednesday, July 9, 2025, at approximately 11:00 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a man brandishing a knife in the 300 block of San Fernando Mission Boulevard. A male subject was arrested for brandishing a weapon other than a firearm and for an outstanding warrant.

- 8. - 11. On Thursday, July 17, 2025, at approximately 10:55 AM, SFPD officers received a Flock ALPR alert regarding a stolen vehicle near North Maclay Avenue and Glenoaks Boulevard. Officers located the vehicle and arrested a male suspect for grand theft auto. During booking, officers discovered the suspect had a federal warrant issued by the U.S. Marshals. He was transported to the U.S. Marshals' office for transfer of custody.
- 12. On Saturday, July 19, 2025, at about 3:15 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle driving without license plates in the area of North Brand Boulevard and Library Street. Following an investigation, the officer arrested the driver for an outstanding warrant.
- 13. On Saturday, July 19, 2025, around 3:20 AM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic stop of a vehicle that had run a red light in the area of San Fernando Road and San Fernando Mission Boulevard. Upon contact with the driver, the officer observed signs of alcohol intoxication. Following a field sobriety test, the driver was arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol and driving with a blood alcohol content of .08 percent or higher.
- 14. On Sunday, July 20, 2025, at approximately 11:00 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a battery in the 500 block of Glenoaks Boulevard. Following their investigation, they arrested a male subject for battery.
- 15. On Monday, July 21, 2025, around 9:10 PM, SFPD officers responded to the 1100 block of Truman Street regarding misuse of the 911 system. A male subject was arrested for providing false identification to an officer and misusing the 911 emergency system.
- 16. On Tuesday, July 22, 2025, at about 9:50 PM, SFPD officers responded to a domestic dispute in the 1000 block of North Huntington Street. After investigating, officers arrested a male subject for domestic battery.

- 17. On Friday, July 25, 2025, at approximately 2:20 PM, an SFPD officer stopped a vehicle with an obstructed license plate near San Fernando Mission Boulevard and Celis Street. During the stop, the driver who had multiple outstanding warrants fled the scene, initiating a vehicle pursuit. The driver collided with several vehicles, then fled on foot and hid in a crawl space in the 14000 block of Hagar Street. He was ultimately arrested for kidnapping, false imprisonment, felony evading, felony hit and run causing injury, and resisting arrest.
- 18. On Saturday, July 26, 2025, around 3:10 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a possible burglary at a business in the 1800 block of First Street. After investigating, officers arrested a male subject for burglary, possession of a controlled substance, and two outstanding warrants.
